

Bloomington Residents Resisting Trend Toward Warehouse Development

In the unincorporated blue collar community of Bloomington sharp differences have arisen over county officials' approval of a warehouse project within close proximity to a school.

Project advocates and those affiliated with the county, including those making recommendations that the warehouse

project be approved and those who voted to allow it to proceed, consider the addition of warehouses to be a step forward for the community. Bloomington is spread along the periphery of Fontana and Rialto, and north of the border with Riverside County, an area which was historically an agricultural one with substantial modest

infill residential development. Over the last half century, what was once a largely rustic area has haphazardly absorbed what is now a jumble of commercial uses along the two major arteries though the area, the I-10 Freeway and Valley Boulevard, many of them transportation related. South of the freeway, a hodgepodge of

heavier industrial uses have come to dot the landscape over the last half century, an adjunct to the long-existing rail line spanning east and west. What officials say are marginally noncompliant uses of residential properties proliferate in the area, such as half-acre residential properties being used for truck parking or storage of in-

dustrial equipment and machinery. Land values and retail tax revenue in the area is barely capable of defraying what virtually everyone acknowledges are inadequate services and infrastructure. The development fees to be paid by the warehouse builders and the increase in property value and therefore uprating in property tax See P 3

Steinorth Will Leave Assembly And Seek Election As Second District Supervisor

In a development that seems likely to further advance the Democrats' vise-like grip on the state legislature and governance in California, 40th District Assemblyman Marc Steinorth, R-Rancho Cucamonga, has dropped his bid for reelection to the state post and will instead seek election as Second District San Bernardino

County supervisor. Steinorth's decision

renders it quite likely that the 40th District Assembly position will go to current San Bernardino County Third District Supervisor James Ramos, a Democrat who declared his candidacy for the Assembly in January.

In California, both houses of the legislature at present have Democratic majorities and the

offices of governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, controller and secretary of state are currently held by Democrats. Earlier this decade, both the California Assembly and the California Senate had memberships composed of more than two-thirds Democrats, giving the Democrats a so-called supermajority which deprived

the Republicans of any parliamentary leverage with which to check Democratic legislative or gubernatorial agendas. That supermajority was broken with the removal of three Democratic office holders as the result of scandal or criminal wrongdoing on their part. Public Employee Pension Crisis Threatening Cities' Continuation

The lion's share of municipal governments in California, many of the state's 58 county governments and the state government itself are on a collision course with fiscal reality that is threatening to bankrupt scores or even hundreds of political jurisdictions or entities and reduce the future provision of public services to critical levels or eliminate them entirely.

The circumstance

comes about as a consequence of past and current commitments to provide lucrative pensions to public employees, such that in some of the state's political subdivisions taxpayers are already paying retired workers more than they are paying ones who are currently employed. By the early 2020s just about every city in the state participating in the California Public Employees Retire-

Impoverished Joshua Tree Pair Arrested For Living With Children In Hovel Released

The Joshua Tree couple arrested and jailed last week amid much fanfare suggesting they had been abusing their three children after the family was found living in squalor on a trash-and-debris strewn property on February 28 have been freed.

Daniel Panico, 73, and Mona Kirk, 51, were released after their \$300,000 bail was

deemed inappropriate in the face of arguments by their attorneys that neither was a flight risk and the facts did not support the elements contained in the charges against them.

Indeed, once the initial flurry of publicity attending the case which suggested that the San Bernardino County pair's action mirrored the case of David Turpin and

Louise Turpin in neighboring Riverside County subsided, a reassessment of the circumstances resulted in a widespread conclusion that Panico and Kirk were the victims of financial misfortune and in no way were maliciously abusing their children.

The cases against Panico and Kirk, however, consisting of three separate charges of child

abuse against both of them, remain on track. They are scheduled for a pre-preliminary hearing on March 13 and a preliminary hearing on the Ides of March.

In the case of the Turpins, they were involved in the shackling, beating and deliberate starvation of their 12 children within the confines of a home in a typical residential neighborhood in

Perris, despite their possession of the monetary means that allowed them to license and operate a home school which they had manipulated to prevent the outside world from witnessing their depredations.

While Panico and Kirk were housing their children in a makeshift desert shack with no running water or heating, they had See P 6


The storied political career of Joe Baca, which has soared to significant heights and dived to crushing depths, has yet to close out, as he is making another run for Congress.

Similar to a prize fighter who doesn't get into gear until being punched in the face several times, Baca's political career did not move forward in earnest until he had been defeated by the same political opponent, Jerry Eaves, on two separate occasions. Indeed, Baca, a Democrat, once seemed boxed in by Eaves, another Democrat who had the solid backing of the Inland Empire's labor unions, which dominated Democratic politics at that time. But Baca was able to transform his willingness to put up with defeat and then bounce back from it to eventually replace Eaves in the California Assembly and then accede to the U.S. House of Representatives, a political station Eaves was never able to attain. ment System other than the most newly formed ones will be paying out more in pensions than they will be paying still-working employees.

The beneficiaries of this arrangement – public employees already retired or set to retire over the next three decades – were able to forge for themselves the generous benefits over the last two generations by means of pooling their union dues to create political action committees which then made substantial donations to politicians at virtually every level in California politics. The politicians receiving this largesse have included federal office holders such as senators and members of the House of Representatives, state officers from governors, lieutenant governors, attorney generals, controllers, secretaries of state, state senators, assembly members, county officials such as members of the board of supervisors, sheriffs, district attorneys, treasurers, controllers and assessors, and local politicians such as mayors and council members, as well as school board, water board and fire board members. By supplying these politicians with the lifeblood of politics – money with which to run their election campaigns – these public employee unions have essentially purchased the indulgence of the elected officials who vote on setting the salary and benefits for those public employees. In case after case after case throughout the state, politicians have allowed satisfying their major political donors to take precedence over tending to the long term financial health and fiscal viability of the agencies they head.

In California, the largest pension fund entity is the California Public Employees Retirement System, known by its acronym CalPERS. While some governmental entities, including San Bernardino

County, have independent or joint systems to oversee the pension funds for their employees other than CalPERS, the lion's share of government employees in California - 1.6 million of them - have their pensions tied up in the California Public Employees Retirement System.

CalPERS oversees a retirement trust fund which relies on two primary revenue sources: ongoing annual mandatory contributions from the governmental entities employing CalPERS members and the proceeds from investments CalPERS makes.

Per laws passed by the legislature, the members of which were and are beholden to the CalPERS political action committees that provided them with a major portion of the campaign money they used to get into and remain in office, when CalPERS fails to meet its investment earning goals based upon the performance of the stocks and bonds in which the system has invested, then the state government and thousands of local government agencies and school districts are required to increase their mandatory contributions to the pension trust fund.

In previous years, CalPERS set an annual earnings goal for its investments of 7.5 percent. In years when the stock and bond markets were booming, state and local governments needed to come up with no more than the minimal mandatory contributions built into their budgets - some 12.7 percent of standard government budgets, on average - in order to keep the California Public Employee Retirement System afloat. But in those years when CalPERS investment earnings fell short of the 7.5 percent goal, those governmental entities had to make up the difference, meaning providing money in addition to their mandatory annual contributions. For most of the last decade, these governments have been required to make those additional payments, in nearly every case in-

creased contributions exceeding ten percent and in some cases 20 percent of what they were already contributing.

This drain on those governmental entities' available revenue, in particular the revenue available to cities – has resulted in those agencies digging into their dwindling reserves or reducing services or otherwise functioning on budgets that were unbalanced, and in some cases engaging in a combination of two or all three of these activities. In the cases of those cities or agencies with thin reserves, this has pushed them closer and closer toward insolvency.

Now, with CalPERS struggling under a heavier and heavier burden as the roster of retired employees grows and life spans are increasing so that more and more retired employees live into their 70s, 80s and 90s, the amount of money demanded by the ever-consuming CalPERS machine continues to escalate, even as the stock and bond markets sputter and reaching the 7.5 percent earnings goal, which was downrated a few years back to 7 percent, often looms beyond reach.

In the face of that, the CalPERS board recently took steps to ensure that the pension fund remains solvent, moving to change the projected term for recouping investment losses from three decades to two decades. That policy will become effective next year. This has meant that the state government and all of the local government agencies and school districts participating in CalPERS will have to increase their already increased mandatory contributions to the retirement trust fund, which is threatening to push some of the cities that are already considered to be financially marginal even closer to the insolvency precipice. Even ones who are in better shape fiscally at present will see constant inroads on their available revenues in out years, such that they too

may be at the door of either bankruptcy or zero functionality in another decade or so.

At the turn of the millennium, CalPERS was more than 100 percent funded. In response to confident pronouncements by CalPERS officials that the pension system would remain fully funded for the next several decades, elected officials in hundreds of locales complied with union requests to increase salaries and the benefit formula for public employees. But with the economic downturn that began in 2007 and which continued with the degradation of stock prices and persisting listless stock performances in numerous sectors since, the CalPERS trust fund lost in the neighborhood of \$100 billion over the next seven years. Even prior to that, prognosticators were warning that the system could not sustain itself. There were efforts to redress the crisis, including the lowering of earnings projections from 7.5 percent to 7 percent and the creation of a two-tiered retirement system that not only substantially decreased the pension benefits for those government workers hired after January 1, 2013 but required them to contribute more money toward their retirement plans.

Those reforms, alas, appear to be too little too late as government employees under the old system will continue to retire in ever greater numbers until 2045 or so, putting more and more

the Democrats will reassert their supermajority in the legislature and maintain their dominant status among the major statewide elective officers.

San Bernardino County, which was for more than three decades a Republican stronghold, remained as one of the last bastions of the GOP in the Golden State, even

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strain on cities, agencies and the state, monopolizing ever more money. There have been mixed signals from state courts and federal bankruptcy courts, with some judges ruling that retirees have no greater standing than a city's or governmental entity's other creditors in a bankruptcy scenario and that retirees must stand in line like everyone else owed money by a collapsing city during a bankruptcy process, while other court rulings have upheld the so-called "California Rule," which is based on a 1955 state court decision which held that pensions offered to governmental employees at the time they are hired become "vested rights" protected by contract law that cannot be cut unless offset by a new benefit of comparable value.

Pending cases before the California Supreme Court could result in a landmark change in the California Rule, opening the way for modification, i.e., reduction of existing pension plans. One potential modification

might be limiting pension payments to those that can be defrayed by the money available to CalPERS through the pre-scheduled contributions from cities and agencies and its investment performances without requiring additional contributions if investment goals are not achieved.

In the alternative, if lawyers for CalPERS succeed in convincing the California Supreme Court that pensions are entirely sacrosanct and cannot be reduced, in a worst case scenario cities throughout California might become insolvent en masse, revoking their charters and abdicating their existence as a last means of coming to terms with the financial demands upon them, surrendering their authority in whole to the counties in which they are located. Such a crisis would likely lead to the implosion of CalPERS altogether and retirees forfeiting their pensions.

after the registration of Democratic voters in the county eclipsed that of Republican voters, as the Republican political machine in the county continued to drive more Republican voters to the polls than did its less coordinated and organized county Democratic Party counterpart.

Steinorth's presence in state office is an illustration of the Republican staying power in the face of growing Democratic numbers in San Bernardino County. He was a two-year veteran of the

Rancho Cucamonga City Council when he ran in 2014 for Assembly in the 40th District, which had been reapportioned following the 2010 Census to comprise Rancho Cucamonga, Lytle Creek, Devore, a sparsely inhabited expense across the San Bernardino Mountain foothills, Highland, San Bernardino, Loma Linda, Redlands and Mentone. At that time, predominant registration in the 40th District was relatively evenly split

revenue will assist in getting the languishing community off top dead center so that services can be enhanced and infrastructure improvements can be made to enable further development and improvements, supporters of the warehouse development maintain.

Conversely, a number of Bloomington residents and their environmental activist supporters perceive the influx of just one or two warehouses to be an invitation for three or four more and then a flood of a dozen or two dozen more thereafter. Even assuming the warehouses are used for no more than simple warehousing of goods and products from which distribution is to be staged, those uses involving a constant flow of trucks in and out of the warehouse yards, the sound pollution of their engines, the air pollution of their exhaust and both the traffic hazard and street destruction of the weighty trucks themselves are incompatible with the still substantially residential nature of Bloomington's neighbor-

hoods, those residents and their supporters insist. And the very real potential that some of the warehouses will house light industrial and manufacturing uses, which in time could transform into medium intensity manufacturing and industrial uses and eventually into heavy industrial concerns that will result in the full eradication of residential properties in the area represents an absolutely unacceptable course with regard to land use for Bloomington as a community, those challenging the government assert.

According to Ericka Flores, a Bloomington resident who is working in conjunction with the Jurupa Valley-based Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice, "Warehouses bring large amounts of diesel truck traffic that pollute nearby communities with toxins that cause asthma, cancer, heart disease, emphysema and early death. The warehouse industry has set its sights on a new target, Bloomington. Despite broad community opposition, a warehouse project was recently approved steps away from the Walter Zimmerman Elementary playground in Bloomington. Even more warehouse proj-

ects have been proposed. Children are especially susceptible to the coming truck pollution, increasing their risks for breathing problems the more often they play outside. We in Bloomington will not accept a world where the more we breathe, the sicker we get. We will not allow our government to break the law and poison our families."

The reference to the government is San Bernardino County, of which Bloomington is an unincorporated community. The county board of supervisors, which is in general advised with regard to zoning and development issues by the county's land use services division and the county planning commission, is the direct governmental authority overseeing Bloomington. In San Bernardino County, the member of the board of supervisors in whose district a particular community lies is given primary sway with regard to decisions impacting that particular property. In the case of Bloomington, Fifth District Supervisor Josie Gonzales, who was prior to her elevation to the board of supervisors in 2004 a member of the city council in neighboring Fontana, is the elected governmental official in whom overriding authority is entrusted. Directly counseling Gonzales with regard to Bloomington are the members of the Bloomington Municipal Advisory Council, which is composed of Bloomington residents chosen by Gonzales for that role. The Bloomington Municipal Advisory Council members are Gary Grossich, Israel Fuentes, Jackie Cox, Betty Gosney, Eric Scott and Chairman Larry Burgos.

According to Grossich, the county's decision to allow what he said was a "modest" number of warehouses to be built in Bloomington was based on a well-thought through analysis that included input from the council, the community at large and consideration of a previously

prepared planning document, the Bloomington Community Plan. "Our reasoning is based upon the Bloomington Community Plan and supporting the wishes of the community," Grossich told the *Sentinel*. "Over two years ago the county began a process to update the Bloomington Community Plan. Since then, six community outreach events have been held. During these meetings three main issues became apparent. One, Bloomington and its residents are suffering due to lack of services. Two, revenue currently generated from Bloomington doesn't even come close to covering the current lack of services, let alone an increase. In reality we are currently being subsidized by the county for the woefully inadequate services we receive. We're not in any financial position to expect any additional services. The only other way to generate money for increased services is a substantial tax on our residents. I can tell you it would end up being a large tax and the chances of that passing in Bloomington are slim and none. Three, development and business growth in our community is the only viable way to generate revenues to pay for services our residents need and deserve."

The impoverished community's financial situation is what has given rise to the decision to allow the warehouses to be built, Grossich said.

"Bloomington's unemployment rate is 30 percent higher than the national average," Grossich said. "Per capita income in Bloomington is only about half the national average. Only about 40 percent of Bloomington residents have even graduated from high school and only a small fraction of those have a college degree. The bottom line is we need to provide balanced development growth and job opportunities for our residents."

Grossich said those opposed to warehouse development represent a minority of the residents

in Bloomington and that they are outnumbered by others who look favorably upon the initial incremental steps toward community development. He said bringing in warehouse projects approved under terms and standards laid down by the county's land use services division represents a bulwark against the continuing proliferation of non-compliant hazardous operations that have already invaded Bloomington's residential neighborhoods.

"Documents from the Bloomington Community Plan meetings which were used to create a list of services our residents want show 91 percent wanted more and better code enforcement, especially regarding the illegal trucking operations which are taking over residential neighborhoods and operating near schools," Grossich said. "57 percent want a dedicated full time sheriff's deputy to improve our public safety. 53 percent want dedicated truck routes to protect our schools and residential neighborhoods from the negative impacts of illegal trucking. Our residents also asked for increased area of sewer service; along with infrastructure improvements and better road maintenance. During this process one of the things the Bloomington Municipal Advisory Council has demanded is that all development impact fees from any new projects be set aside in a separate fund to remain in Bloomington to pay for additional services over and above what we currently receive."

Grossich continued, "Bloomington is being subsidized, even for the low level of services we currently receive. Total revenues in Bloomington are only \$2.2 million a year, including what the county puts in the pot. Grand Terrace is half the size with half the land and they're barely making ends meet with revenues of \$4.5 million, more than twice what we get. As with all cities, Grand Terrace has a blend of resi-

dential, commercial and industrial uses. In any city the commercial and industrial uses bring in by far the most revenue and subsidize residential areas which cost more to service than the revenue residential uses generate. All healthy cities have a balance of commercial, residential and industrial uses. Typically most cities have about 20-30 percent commercial, 50-60 percent residential and 20-25 percent industrial. In Colton 23.9 percent of the city is zoned industrial. Bloomington currently is zoned for less than 12 percent industrial. I believe we have less than six warehouses in the entire community."

Grossich said, "Increasing the industrial component in appropriate areas of least impact to the community will increase revenues to help pay for additional services, increase investment by providing infrastructure improvements and create much needed job opportunities for our residents. For these reasons the Bloomington Municipal Advisory Council is in unanimous support of the only warehouse currently under consideration in Bloomington. This project is called the Bloomington Business Center and is located on Slover Avenue along the I-10 Freeway on a heavily traveled industrial corridor directly across the street from another warehouse and close to the Union Pacific Railroad yard. In fact the next parcel to the west is already zoned industrial and an industrial operation would be permitted by right to be built there. It makes perfect sense to place these types of operations on existing truck routes along with other properties which are already zoned for industrial use."

Advocates against the warehouses maintain it is not accurate to suggest that plans and measures to assure that the warehouses and the heavy vehicles that will assuredly accompany them and the industrial uses that may be attached to them will be adequately

between Republicans and Democrats at near 36 percent apiece, and Steinorth cruised to an easy victory over Democrat Kathleen Henry, who put on a lackluster campaign. Steinorth enjoyed the advantage of not only the San Bernardino County Republican political machine and his greater visibility and name recognition as a member of the Rancho Cucamonga City Council, but was also the owner of his own advertising and direct mail company, which gave him an understanding of the principles of disseminating public information and a command over the means for doing so.

Two years ago, in the run-up toward the June primary election, the Democrats had begun to open up what was a modest registration advantage over the Republicans in the 40th Assembly District, as 75,085 or 37.9 percent of the district's 198,180 voters were registered as Democrats and 70,947 or 35.8 percent were registered Republicans. In the head-to-head June 2014 primary contest between Steinorth and San Bernardino City School District Board Member Abigail Medina, Medina

prevailed with 36,524 votes or 50.49 percent to Steinorth's 35,814 votes or 49.51 percent. Under the California Elections Code, primary elections are not final in runs for statewide office, and the two highest vote-getters advance to the November general election.

Between June and November 2016, the Democrats, sensing Steinorth was vulnerable, pumped more than \$2.4 million into the effort to unseat him and advance Medina to the statehouse. That included an energetic voter registration drive to sign up voters oriented favorably toward the Democratic Party. By election day in November 2016, the Democrats had increased their 2.1 percent registration advantage over the Republicans in the 40th Assembly District to nearly four percent. But Steinorth, who was provided with \$1.2 million by the Republican Party and independent expenditure committees – half of the budget Medina had to work with – used his experience and expertise to efficiently and wisely place his campaign shots, appealing to independent voters and those affiliated with non-mainstream parties. In the November run-off, he prevailed, capturing 76,537 votes or 50.64 percent to Medina's 74,589 votes or 49.36

percent.

Since then, the registration advantage favoring the Democrats in the 40th District has grown, so that as of this week 89,219 or 40.2 percent of the district's voters are Democrats and 73,212 or 33 percent of the district's voters are Republicans.

In January, James Ramos, the one-time chairman of the San Manuel Indian Tribe who has been a member of the board of supervisors representing the Third District since 2012 and was the chairman of the board of supervisors in 2016 and 2017, moved to challenge Steinorth. Ramos embodies multiple advantages in his political ambition. While San Bernardino County is yet perceived as a Republican redoubt within Democratic California or at least remains a Republican-friendly place, the Democrats are clearly on the march within it. Of the county's five districts, the First, comprising much of the desert, the Second, which includes all of Rancho Cucamonga, San Antonio Heights, north Upland, Mt. Baldy, Wrightwood and some of the mountain communities including Lake Arrowhead and Crestline, and the Third District, which involves Redlands, Highland, Big Bear, Loma Linda, Mentone, Yucaipa, Yuc-

ca Valley, Twentynine Palms and Barstow, are considered the remaining Republican hold-outs. In both the Fourth and Fifth districts, voter registration is heavily weighted in favor of the Democrats. It is a testament to James Ramos' appeal that the Republicans in the Third District have accepted him as their political leader. As a leading member of the San Manuel Tribe, which owns a casino, Ramos is entitled to a significant portion of that enterprise's revenue. An unconfirmed report is that his share of the casino proceeds is \$18,000 per day. Given his visibility, his elected position, his membership within the Democratic Party and the amicable relations he has with the county's Republicans, topped by his wealth and his demonstrated willingness to use that wealth to achieve and maintain elected office, Ramos is considered a combination of an irresistible force and unmovable object within the context of San Bernardino County politics.

Steinorth, who at the outset of his political career was something of a Republican firebrand who espoused a conservative - and most particularly a fiscally conservative - philosophy, has found the need to tone down his rhetoric

and find accommodation with the Democrats who rule the roost in Sacramento. Perhaps the most visible demonstration of that accommodation consisted of his decision last year to join a minority of Republicans in support of cap-and-trade legislation, a government regulatory program designed to limit, or cap, the total level of specific chemical by-products resulting from private business, primarily industrial and energy production, activity. Many Republicans are opposed to this type of regulation. With the Democrats advancing in the 40th District and many of the Republicans in the state sore at him for compromising with the Democrats, Steinorth opted last week to set a course for leaving Sacramento at the end of the year and trying to reinvent himself as a county supervisor.

Second District Supervisor Janice Rutherford, like Steinorth a Republican, cut her political teeth as a member of the city council in Fontana and then vaulted into the Second District supervisory post in 2010 by challenging and beating then supervisor Paul Biane, who had been weakened by his connection to scandal-tainted former supervisor Bill Postmus. Rutherford has played it relatively safe

the last seven-and-a-half years, and is largely seen as a caretaker supervisor with few notable achievements. She has a reputation of acceding to county staff recommendations and accommodating the wishes of the cities within her jurisdiction even in the face of widespread constituent opposition to those agendas. This philosophy may have created difficulty for her when last year she supported the Upland City Council in its effort to impose on Upland's citizens a tax without a vote through a move to close out the Upland municipal fire department, annex both Upland and neighboring San Antonio Heights into a county fire service/assessment district and then impose on those residents a \$156 per year fire service assessment they previously had not been required to pay. This occurred in the face of overwhelming resident opposition to the move.

Steinorth is striking while the iron is hot, looking to dislodge his Republican opponent, who did not face a substantial challenge four years ago. Steinorth promises to give that to her this year.

The decision to depart Sacramento, Steinorth said, "was a tough de-

he converted for a short-lived duration into a Republican. Now, he's back to being a Democrat, nevertheless engaged in a pitched battle to unseat an incumbent Democrat.

Born in Belen, New Mexico in 1947, the youngest of 15 children in a primarily Spanish-speaking household, Baca moved to the San Bernardino County railroad town of Barstow when he was young, as his father was a railroad laborer. Upon graduating from high school, he was following in his father's footsteps, working at the Barstow Santa Fe Railroad yard. He was drafted into the Army in 1966, and served during the Vietnam War Era, though he was not sent to Southeast Asia. Upon his discharge, he attended Barstow Community College and went on to receive his bachelor's degree in sociology from California State University, Los Angeles.

While working for General Telephone in 1979, he became the first Latino elected to the board of trustees for the San Bernardino Valley College District.

In the 1988 June Primary, he challenged Eaves, then the incumbent in the 66th Assembly District. Eaves had previously been able to use his heavy involvement in union and Democratic politics as a consequence of his employment at Fontana's Kaiser Steel Mill to advance himself, and he obtained a berth on the Rialto City Council in 1977, acceded to being Rialto mayor from 1980 to 1984 and had been elected to the California Assembly in 1984. In the 1988 primary race, Baca registered what was for a challenger facing an incumbent legislator a relatively strong showing, though Eaves beat him 56 to 44 percent. Baca again sought to unseat Eaves in the 1990 Democratic Primary, losing that time 57 to 43 percent.

In 1992, following

the reapportionment following the 1990 Census, Eaves and Baca were now on course to duke it out for primacy in the 62nd Assembly District. At that point, however, Eaves opted to leave Sacramento to vie for Fifth District San Bernardino County supervisor. He endorsed his protégé, Rialto Mayor John Longville. Baca pressed forward, engaging in a hard-fought battle against Longville, who had the advantage of superior funding his ally, Eaves, was able to vector to him from a host of donors up and down the state, ones Eaves had access to as a consequence of his time in the state legislature. Baca, however, bested Longville and moved into the state's lower legislative house. Baca remained in the California Assembly for six years and in 1998, just as he exhausted the three terms he was eligible to serve under the state's term limit law put in place in 1990, was conveniently able to transition and step up into the upper legislative house, succeeding Ruben S. Ayala in the California Senate's 32nd District.

Just a few months after Baca was elected to the state senate, 42nd District Congressman George Brown, Jr., the venerable 33-year veteran of Congress who had represented portions of Los Angeles, San Bernardino and Riverside counties from just after his first election in 1962 with a two year hiatus from January 1971 until January 1973 brought on when he unsuccessfully sought the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senate in 1970, died. Baca seized the opportunity this provided and finished first in a seven-way primary, but fell short of a majority to capture the post outright. In the runoff, Baca defeated Republican Elia Pirozzi with 50.4 percent to 49.6 percent. He won the seat more convincingly with 59 percent of the vote in 2000. After the 2000 census, Baca was reapportioned into California's 43rd Congressional

District, a majority-Hispanic district. Baca was easily reelected in this redrawn district in 2002, and was handily elected there throughout the remainder of the first decade of the Third Millennium.

Baca obtained berths on the House Financial Services Committee, where he was a member of the Subcommittee on Capital Markets, Insurance, and Government Sponsored Enterprises, and the Subcommittee on Financial Institutions and Consumer Credit; as well as on the House Agriculture Committee, where he was the ranking member of the Subcommittee on Departmental Operations, Oversight, Nutrition and Forestry. As a member of Congress, he championed increasing Hispanic representation on corporate boards and in executive suites, doing so as the chairman of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus. He created and co-chaired the Congressional Sex and Violence in the Media Caucus. He was also an animated member of the Military/Veterans Caucus, and participated in the Congressional Diabetes Caucus, the Native American Caucus and the U.S.-Mexico Caucus.

After the 2010 United States Census, California's congressional map underwent a significant redrafting, and most of the 43rd District was folded into the 35th District, although Baca's residence in Rialto was placed into the 31st District. Nevertheless, Baca opted to use that provision of federal law which requires only that a Congress member live within the state of the district he represents so that he could remain as the congressman to the lion's share of the constituents he had been representing, declaring his candidacy in the 35th District. In the 35th it seemed Baca would be safe, given its heavy Democratic and Latino demographics, his incumbency and his name recognition. It appeared that he stood a strong likelihood of remaining in Congress at

least until the next reapportionment in 2022, or perhaps beyond that.

Because of these favorable demographics and his incumbency, Baca felt himself to be at liberty to indulge his foray toward what is conventionally considered to be conservatism on at least some issues, his support of Second Amendment gun rights among them. In this way, Baca proudly celebrated his membership in the so-called Blue Dog Coalition, commonly known as the Blue Dogs or Blue Dog Democrats, a caucus of Democratic Congressman who self-identify as political conservatives.

This put Baca at odds with billionaire Michael Bloomberg, the one-time Republican mayor of New York City whose term in office had been marred by recurrent gun violence, and who had become the leader of a crusade to enact stronger federal gun control laws and regulations. In one respect, this put Bloomberg out of step with his own party, and he had unabashedly appealed to Democrats, whom he saw as his allies with regard to effectuating gun control legislation. In 2012, Baca appeared poised to remain in Congress and to comfortably transition into being the House member in the newly drawn 35th District. In that year's primary election conducted under California's all-party primary rules in which the top two finishers regardless of party affiliation qualify for the November general election, Baca captured what appeared to be a commanding victory with 12,619 votes or 47.17 percent, as opposed to the 9,078 votes or 33.93 percent picked up by Gloria Negrete-McLeod, a Democratic California state senator, and Anthony Vieyra, a Green Party candidate, who polled 5,58 votes or 19.9 percent. Having outdistanced McLeod in the primary by well over 13 percentage points and figuring he needing to capture less than one-sixth of the votes that

had gone to Vieyra in the June election to be victorious in November, Baca was confident that he would return as a member of the 113th United States Congress, the 2013-2014 meeting term of the legislative branch of the United States federal government, and that his reelection in November 2012 would prove a mere formality.

In late September 2012, however, with little fanfare, Bloomberg had an independent political expenditure committee he endowed and controlled provide Negrete-McLeod with \$2 million. Outfitted with that money, the Negrete-McLeod campaign went into high gear, purchasing newspaper ads and sending out mailers touting her and her candidacy, augmented with hit pieces demonizing Baca. It was not until the second week of October that Baca and his political team recognized what was upon them. After being rocked back on its heels, the Baca political campaign began to regroup to respond, whereupon Bloomberg three weeks before the close of the campaign gave Negrete-McLeod another \$1.2 million. The Baca campaign was yet seeking to get back on track when a final blitz of negative advertisement targeting Baca hit, this time in the form of radio and television spots that buried the incumbent. When the votes were tallied, Negrete-McLeod had vanquished Baca, 61,129 votes or 54.36 percent to 51,319 or 45.64 percent.

Two years later, Baca attempted to stage a comeback but, having lost the magic of incumbency, he was thwarted in the June 2014 primary when he ran for Congress in the California 31st District, again as a Democrat, placing fifth overall in a seven-candidate race behind two Republicans and two Democrats, including the eventual winner, Democrat Pete Aguilar.

Particularly galling to Baca was that Negrete-McLeod, after a single term in Congress, claiming she was wearying

of the transcontinental flights between Washington, D.C. and Southern California every two weeks, opted out of running for reelection to Congress in 2014, instead vying, unsuccessfully, for Fourth District San Bernardino County supervisor, losing to Republican Curt Hagman. Norma Torres, a Democrat and the one-time mayor of Pomona who had gone on to serve in the California Assembly and then acceded into Negrete-McLeod's state senate position in 2012 when she ran against Baca, filled the void in the 35th Congressional District.

Again knocked from his horse, Baca showed admirable determination in getting right back up, looking to regain office. This time, having relocated his residence to Fontana, Baca was given a political grub stake by wealthy developer Reggie King of Young Homes, who provided Baca with a \$20,000 donation to jumpstart his campaign against incumbent Fontana Mayor Acquanetta Warren in the November 2014 race.

That King was looking to back the displaced congressman in the contest was somewhat remarkable, given King's penchant for sticking with incumbents in general and his history of backing Warren in particular over the years. Fontana, as much as any city, was of special interest to Young Homes. Having experienced, beginning in the early 1970s, constant if only moderate growth, Fontana in the 1980s captured the imagination of the development community when it approved the 9,100-unit Southridge project. By the 1990s the city was experiencing explosive growth, the eventual upshot of which is that its population has ballooned to 203,000, making it the county's second largest city population-wise. King and Young Homes had solid reason to stay on the good side of the political leadership in Fontana, including

ing Warren. Yet something had begun to drive a wedge between King and Warren. Perhaps it was because of Fontana officials' incipient reluctance to accommodate further growth after they had belatedly begun to recognize the growing pains of a municipality that had overleapt its existing infrastructure and which was expanding too much too fast, and they were looking to put the brakes on future development. Or maybe in sizing up the two, King had concluded that Baca, the one-time congressman with national, state and local interests beholden to him for the legislation he carried and the votes he made, was simply a faster and stronger political racehorse than Warren, whose political horizon ended at the Fontana City Limits.

Whatever the reason, King was in contact with Baca and pushed him into running for Fontana mayor.

Baca, an old political hand, calculated that

he would need to hustle, raise money to equal or match Warren's and limit, to the extent he could, her political reach by beating her to the punch in capturing campaign donations from the same set of potential donors who can be counted upon to bankroll local political races. King's overture matched up with Baca's calculation in every particular. Confident in King's backing and that of others King could with a flick of his wrist line up for him, Baca jumped in and used the money King had provided to set up the framework of a campaign that would soon be, he believed, flush with money.

While Warren held the advantage of incumbency, her advantage was not an insurmountable one, Baca believed. She had nowhere near the political track record Baca could claim, and she had been able to climb no further up the chain than local municipal office, having lost in a previous stab at being elected to the California Assembly. And though she had fundraising capability, one of her major donors over the years had been King, and he now seemed, by virtue

of his willingness to advance Baca \$20,000, signaling that she might not be as well funded in 2014 as she had been previously. Moreover, King was capable of putting the arm on other donors to get them to back Baca and forsake Warren.

Baca went all in, but as August became September, and September turned into October, further backing from King or the other major players in the development community failed to materialize. Rather, a rapprochement of some sort took place between King and Warren to the extent that King came through with \$50,000 for the incumbent mayor. Warren collected, prior to the election, \$173,622 in donations for her re-election bid that year, and another \$20,000 after the election. In addition to the \$50,000 from King, Warren was provided with \$10,000 from Hae Park, the owner of the Bel Air Swap Meet, \$10,000 from YKA Development Group President Yoon Kim, \$2,500 from Lewis Investment Company of Upland, \$5,000 from Frontier Finance Company of Rancho Cucamonga, \$3,000 from Burrtec Waste Sys-

tems, \$5,000 from the San Bernardino Professional Firefighters Association, \$1,500 from F.F. Gomez, Inc. of Whittier, \$10,000 from Richland Management of Irvine, \$10,000 from David Wiener, and \$2,500 from Kirk Jensen of Upland. Baca was never able to get his mayoral election effort off the ground, and after the polls had closed on November 4, 2014, Warren had gathered 10,773 votes or 60.57 percent. Baca finished second, with 3,364 votes or 18.91 percent. Three others, Jason O'Brien, Daniel Quiroga and Luis Vaquera, garnered, respectively 13.66 percent, 4.05 percent and 2.81 percent.

Baca determinedly vied for Congress again in 2016, running in the June primary against Aguilar, hoping to be able to make his way into the November general election against the younger man and perhaps appeal to voters in a toe-to-toe slugfest in which he might make a case that his considerably greater experience and longer list of contacts in the nation's capital would be more advantageous to the district than Aguilar's.

Well before he declared his candidacy, Baca changed parties, saying he had come to identify with the GOP in that it reflected his "core Christian" values. But though Baca made a stronger showing in 2016 than he had in 2014, Republican Paul Chabot was able to capture second place, shutting Baca, who finished third among five candidates, out of the general election.

In August 2016, Baca changed his voter registration from Republican to no party preference. Two months ago, he re-registered as a Democrat. He has now filed papers to run for Congress once more. This time, he will not run in the 31st District, as he did in 2014 and 2016, but will seek the post he lost to Negrete-McLeod, the 35th Congressional District seat now held by Norma Torres.

The 35th at this point is even more heavily weighted in favor of Democrats than when Baca last ran there in 2012. Straddling San Bernardino County and Los Angeles County, the 35th District has 102,258 registered Democrats within it inside San Bernardino County, or 48.5

percent of the district's voters there. On the San Bernardino side of the 35th District divide, 44,983 or 21.4 percent of the voters are registered Republicans. In that portion of the 35th District in Los Angeles County, the Democrats' registration advantage over the Republicans is even more lopsided than in San Bernardino County.

Torres, 52, was born in Guatemala. She has the strength of incumbency, the same advantage that Baca, now 71, wielded so effectively once he had it over the course of his career until he encountered Negrete-McLeod and Bloomberg. Despite his temporary defection from the Democratic Party and his status as a Blue Dog, he possesses solid Democratic bona fides in one respect, having voted in opposition to the war in Iraq in 2002, the only Inland Congressman to do so. He has a middle school named for him in Bloomington.

Baca did not provide the Registrar of Voters Office in San Bernardino a phone number at which members of the press are authorized to contact him.

Steinorth, the father of a nine-year-old and an 18-year-old, said,

Steinorth said, "Since I was first elected to the

Last year alone, I fought \$370 billion in new taxes, including the gas tax increase. I've fought to increase punishments for sex offenders and keep violent criminals in jail where

they belong. I worked to make housing more affordable and the dream of home ownership a reality for all Californians. I worked to increase funding for career and technical training programs in our schools. I also worked on campaign finance reform to hold politicians accountable. I'm proud of everything I've accomplished and the bipartisan matter

in which it was done."

Steinorth said he will be active in San Bernardino if sent there to represent the Second District.

"It's no secret that San Bernardino County residents are tired of listening to rhetoric while crime increases, there's a shortage of officers to keep us safe and the cost of living continues to skyrocket," he said. "The

number of officers on the streets hasn't kept up with the demand due to the increase in crime. We deserve a representative with real world experience that isn't just looking for their next paycheck. As the owner of a family run small business I've created thousands of jobs throughout my life and I don't plan

been driven to extremity by financial perdition. Two days after Panico and Kirk's arrest, Joshua Tree Superior Court Judge Bert Swift on March 2 had assented to the imposition of \$300,000 bail on each of them and they had been transported to West Valley Detention Center in Rancho Cucamonga. On Tuesday, Elizabeth Crabtree, Mona Kirk's

attorney, and Michael Kennedy, Daniel Panico's attorney, convinced Judge Joel Agron to release them both on their own recognizance.

Crabtree and Kennedy are now angling to have the cases in their entirety dropped.

Panico had been living with his family in a home in Joshua Tree but was obliged to leave there after the house's owner died and the deceased man's family evicted Panico, Kirk and the

children. Panico moved with his family into an eight-foot wide, 24-foot long Prowler trailer on property within the 7000 block of Sun Fair Road in Joshua Tree, less than three-quarters of a mile as the crow flies from Highway 62, which is also known as 29 Palms Highway.

Initially, the family had been staying in the trailer, but at some point left it to take up quarters in a structure Panico had fashioned from ply-

wood and tarps. Though unheated, it was insulation from the ground by means of mattresses and blankets. At least 30 cats which the family had adopted were living on the property, as well. Panico had allowed the cats, one of his acquaintances said, to live out of the trailer to shelter them from marauding coyotes, feral dogs and other predators.

The property upon which the family was living was barely visible to

the outside world, as it is covered in creosote and sparse desert vegetation which hides the debris and trash-strewn parcel from the few passers-by traversing the area.

The sheriff's department came across the family and their circumstance when deputies came onto property ostensibly to check on the Prowler, which they believed might have been abandoned.

The children were not enrolled within the Mo-

rongo Unified School District. They were not malnourished, however, and residents of the area say that Panico frequently sojourned into town to purchase food for his family.

Panico and Kirk reportedly intended to construct a more elaborate home on the property, but did not have the means to undertake that project.

separated or “buffered” from both homes and schools in Bloomington. They point out that a 34-acre logistics warehouse to be located 260 feet from Walter Zimmerman Elementary School was approved by the San Bernardino County Planning Commission and then by the board of supervisors. There was doubt about the wisdom of the undertaking, these critics point out. The board of supervisors narrowly approved the project by a 3-2 vote. That betokens a less than sterling assurance the warehouse was properly sited, the Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice maintains.

According to the environmental impact report submitted by the project's developer, Western Realco, the warehouse itself will not exceed the South Coast Air Quality Management District's threshold for significant pollution. But parents of students from Zimmerman Elementary say

that the emissions from the fork lift trucks and other vehicles and activities within the building are not the sole problem. They enumerated concerns over truck traffic to and from the warehouse, the fumes from those trucks, many of which are anticipated to be powered by diesel engines. Moreover, the hazards of having large trucks negotiating the streets where children are walking to and from school give those parents pause.

Public health surveys and scientific studies into the impact of vehicle exhaust on the health of children demonstrate that juveniles who live close to heavy traffic or are otherwise exposed to particulates from heavy trucks have more serious health problems, including asthma, statistically than do youths who are not so exposed.

Parents and activists with the Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice assert that the environmental impact report for the Western Realco warehouse project was biased

Last Seasonal Bald Eagle Count Is Tomorrow

The public is invited to join local biologists for the last bald eagle count of the season on Saturday, March 10, 2018, to help count the species wintering around six Inland Empire lakes. Observers meet at one of the count locations for a short orientation and then they proceed to their observation sites where they record their observations between 9 and 10 a.m. Then they return to the meeting location to turn in the data sheet. The biologists use those data to determine the minimum number of eagles in the area.

No experience is needed. Signing up ahead of time is unnecessary — just show up at the designated time and location, dress warmly, bring binoculars and a watch.

Grossich said, “As with all projects this development has been going through a rigorous environmental impact report which is available on line. In speaking with the developer after their presentations, I've been impressed with the extra efforts they've made to minimize or eliminate any potential negative impacts to the four homes on the back side of the project. The developer has a large setback on the rear and all truck docks will be on the front side of the building, keeping them as far away as possible from the four houses. In reading through the environmental impact report, I also noted that there is a 1,000 foot-plus buffer between where the trucks dock and Bloomington High School; the trucks can only enter or exit the site from the front on Slover Ave; the trucks are restricted from traveling

past Bloomington High School and can only travel east or west on Slover, and trucks will not be allowed to idle while on the property. There are many other requirements under the environmental impact report and the conditional use permit process, but I wanted to point out the ones which address the concerns that have been brought up. With this, I think it's important to note that there are several illegal diesel trucking operations less than 1,000 feet from Bloomington High School, including a couple right on the high school property line.”

Though the Bloomington residents opposed to the warehouse project, concerned parents of students at Walter Zimmerman Elementary and activists with the Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice reiterated their belief that the environmental impact report was inad-

quate, they acknowledged that there was little if any prospect of overturning the project approval. The prevailing attitude is that action needs to be taken going forward that will prevent other warehouse projects from being approved.

The Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice said it is committed to changing the political and social landscape of the Inland Valley and to focus on those most affected by environmental health hazards, low-income communities of color and recent immigrants who live, work, learn and play closest to rail yards, industrial areas, toxic waste facilities, intermodal facilities, freeways and other areas at greatest risk for environmental health hazards.

Flores said, “We're holding community meetings, we're giving testimony to our representatives, we're telling the press about this injus-

tice. We're standing up for our rights, and while there is more hard work ahead, our efforts are paying off. Our story is getting out there. When a city council member came to our community meeting with warehouse industry lies, attempting to convince us that our lungs didn't matter as much as we thought, he was booed. Now we're working to get the Colton Joint Unified School Board to agree to stand with us in opposition to school-adjacent warehouses that will make our children sick. We will not stop fighting until we win. We will not stop until our children are safe and the future health of Bloomington is secure.”

That clashed with Grossich's vision, which is that Bloomington will benefit from more warehouses. “We are looking forward to projects like this bringing in

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



to stop now. Actions speak louder than words

and I've taken action for our community."

Steinorth referenced Rutherford's support of the annexation of Upland and San Antonio Heights into a county service area and the accompany-

ing \$156 assessment imposed on residents without a vote.
