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2018 Election Offers Window On Grand Terrace's Decade Long Turmoil

Over the last decade of its 40 year history as an incorporated municipality, Grand Terrace has experienced a degree of political turmoil that far outruns its diminutive size.


At 3.5 square miles and a population that has hovered between 11,700 and 12,700 for more than twenty years, Grand Terrace is the smallest city in San Bernardino

County geographically and the third smallest of the county's 24 mu-

nicipalities in terms of population. Historically thought of as southern Colton and the bastion of the wealthy business elite that dominated that city in the early and middle of the 20th Century, a small degree of controversy attended the effort to incorporate the city in the 1970s. Advocates of forming the city had to overcome the designs of some Colton officials

to annex it into their city and a recommendation by the staff for the

San Bernardino County Local Agency Formation Commission, which hashes out solutions to jurisdictional disputes among the county's cities, against Grand Terrace being allowed to form as its own entity, since it did not have a sufficient commercial base to generate the needed sales tax revenue to pay for municipal operations. **See P 2**

Republican Affiliation Puts Hispanic Officeholder Negrete In Liberal Crosshairs

The 2018 election and the vicissitudes of partisan politics have come together to cloud what once seemed to be Victorville Councilman Eric Negrete's promising career as a public official.

Among a rising tide of Hispanic elected officials in California, Negrete is somewhat out of the mainstream in that

he identifies as a conservative Republican, while the vast majority of Latinos in general as well as those vying for or holding office are Democrats, with most of those embracing what are commonly described as liberal or progressive ideals.

That is not true of Negrete, who more stridently than any others


on the Victorville City Council objected to liberal activism by Blanca

Gomez, who was elected to the council in 2016, two years after Negrete's 2014 elevation to the city council. Almost immediately after she took office, Gomez began using her perch on the council as a bully pulpit to espouse her heartfelt beliefs. Less than a month after she was sworn in as a Victorville councilwoman, Gomez on De-

cember 30, 2016 showed up at Rialto City Hall for a rally put on by Rialto City Councilman Rafael Trujillo in support of Senate Bill 54 and the sanctuary city concept. Senate Bill 54, the so-called "Sanctuary State" law, bars state and local law enforcement agencies from using their resources, including money, facility, **See P 7**

Qualifying him to serve on the council, Estrada said, is "my 23 years of government experience. I'm serving my third term as chairman on the Redlands Traffic Commission. I've served in many capacities at the civic and management level, including the disaster council, with our Redlands schools as a member of the Local

Control and Accountability Plan Advisory Committee and the bond oversight citizens committee. I have donated my time as a cardio-pulmonary resuscitation instructor where 100 percent of the funds go towards the school's PTA fund. My qualifications began with a college internship with the City of Pasadena. I'm a Marine veteran and

have served my previous city as a sworn non-paid auxiliary firefighter, traffic commissioner, planning commissioner, and member of an adhoc committee to review city contracts for compliance and oversight."



"I am running because Paul asked me to when he became ill and before he passed way," Raft said. "I had been mayor pro tem," she said, meaning she is the city council's **See P 6**



mately, however, after considerable lobbying by a core group of Grand Terrace residents, county and state officials gave go-ahead to the founding of the city, which occurred officially on November 30, 1978.

Under the guidance of the city's first city manager, Seth Armstead, the city managed to maintain a low profile, despite its prominent position at the far extreme of the La Loma Hills overlooking the confluence of the I-10 and I-215 freeways, with Colton to its north and west, Loma Linda to its east and Riverside to its south. Armstead kept things quiet and noncontroversial until he handed the reins of the city off to his finance director and assistant, Tom Schwab in 1989. For nearly two decades thereafter, Schwab as city manager flew Grand Terrace's plane of state below the radar, keeping things on an even keel and avoiding any major faux pas or contretemps, and quickly extinguishing any brush fires of untoward attention from what was essentially a bedroom community with a modest commercial district. Schwab had used proven deft at using bureaucratic sleight-of-hand to make the city's books balance and allow Grand Terrace to continue as a going concern, even with its minuscule commercial and sales tax base. One of those tactics included overlaying the entirety of the city into a redevelopment project area and then utilizing the redevelopment agency to pay for not only building infrastructure but having the city borrow from the redevelopment agency's coffers to meet the city's operational expenses, and, after a decent interim, forgiving those loans.

All was good, or seemed so, until 2008 when Schwab suffered a subdural hematoma, and was hospitalized. Assistant City Manager Steve

Berry was appointed to fill in as acting city manager during Schwab's absence. Berry, however, coveted the role of city manager, and in 2009, after Schwab had recovered, a struggle ensued between the two in which what was at stake was whether Schwab would return or Berry would be promoted from his interim status to actual city manager. The battle royal between Schwab and his one-time protégé threatened to tear the sedate city apart and interrupt the community harmony that had been for many its most endearing quality. Virtually everyone in the hamlet seemed to be taking sides: with Schwab stood the city's Old Guard and traditionalists. Berry, on the other

hand, had the advantage of having day-to-day control of City Hall and the trust of a majority of the council, which he had cultivated during his more than six months in the capacity of acting city manager. Only then-Councilman Jim Miller was completely favorably disposed toward allowing Schwab to return. The other members of the council – then-Mayor Maryetta Ferré, LeeAnn Garcia, Bea Cortes and Walt Stanckiewitz – were concerned about Schwab's health and his ability to pick up where he had left off. Initially, the balance of the council appeared to be gravitating toward elevating Berry to the position of full-fledged city manager. Schwab, however, was not without assets and options. Yet ensconced in the city's structure was Jo Vehalle, who had been Schwab's executive secretary and had remained in a similar capacity with Berry. Vehalle, who was able to liaison with the executive secretary who had proceeded her,

Betty Trimble, managed to secret out from the city's files documentation showing that relatively early in his tenure as assistant city manager Berry had been involved in an embezzlement that had been buried by city officials to spare the city embarrassment. Just as the skullduggery with regard to the unearthing of Berry's employment jacket was being effectuated, the city council was in the act of conferring upon Schwab a retirement package that upped considerably the pension he would receive, which served as an inducement for him to end his effort to return as city manager. In the meantime, the sordid details of the embezzlement Berry had been involved in, which was at that point beyond the statute of limitations, tumbled into public view, with multiple press accounts relating to the case being published. Reluctantly, both Ferré and Stanckiewitz came to understand that keeping Berry in place would subsume the city in scandal, and he was terminated. Bernie Simon, the city's finance director, was designated to serve as acting city manager following Berry's departure.

To the extent that the community of Grand Terrace had been able to maintain an air of probity and simplicity up to that point, the Schwab/Berry chapter ended the city's innocence. From that point forward, the city has careened from one controversy to another, replete with political rivalries that had not seemed to exist previously, accompanied by community tension.

In the aftermath of the Berry debacle, Betsy Adams was brought in as city manager. She made a not wholly successful effort to return the city to the placid state it had been in for the first three decades of its existence. Stanckiewitz, a local entrepreneur, in short order vaulted to the top of the political heap in Grand Terrace following the decision of Ferré, who had been highly agitated over the negative publicity that attended the

rivalry between Schwab and Berry and who was the daughter of longtime Colton Mayor Albert Huntoon and the wife of Riverside Highland Water Company Board President John Franklin "Frank" Ferré, to make her exit from local politics. Both Adams and Mayor Stanckiewitz wrestled with getting a handle on financial challenges that had beset the city as a consequence of its status as an insular bedroom community with a limited sales tax base, the lingering recessionary impacts of the 2007 economic downturn and the California Legislature's shuttering of redevelopment agencies throughout the state. This latter factor was particularly acute in

Grand Terrace, given the fashion in which Schwab had structured the use of redevelopment agency pass-throughs to the city as a revenue source. In 2010, when Stanckiewitz was elected mayor and Schwab made an unsuccessful electoral bid for city council, Stanckiewitz had already begun to assail Schwab for what Stanckiewitz insisted had been irresponsible ploys in running the city and its reliance on legally questionable and ultimately undependable and unsustainable revenue sources. When the legislature shuttered redevelopment agencies the following year, partially justifying that move by referencing the manner in which some cities had abused a process originally intended to facilitate the eradication of blight, Stanckiewitz ventured an assertion that what had been occurring in Grand Terrace going back 20 years was precisely the kind of abuse the legislature was referring to. In coming to terms with the city's fiscal reality and the four

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financial walls closing in on City Hall, Stanckiewitz and the council he led signed off on Adams' austerity measures, which consisted primarily of staff reductions that left the city with what was essentially a skeleton crew of municipal employees. Throughout that bloodletting Stanckiewitz decried the past performance of Schwab.

In their effort to map the city out of the red ink-filled hole it found itself in, Stanckiewitz and Adams cast about for a solution, at last hitting upon Measure C, a five percent utility tax proposal sponsored by the city that went before the voters in November 2013.

Leaping into the breach at that point however, was a self-styled political reformer, Jeffrey McConnell. A real estate agent and owner of agricultural property at the far extent of the city near the Santa Ana River, McConnell, together with Doug Wilson and Mark Jolstead, spearheaded an informational campaign aimed at convincing Grand Terrace voters that the tax was unnecessary and that judicious budget cuts in city operations, including reductions in what the group characterized as overly generous salaries and benefits to the city's remaining workers, would stave off the financial crisis Stanckiewitz and other city officials claimed justified their call for the tax.

Calling Measure C a "business killing tax," the group charged the city with both "scare tactics" and a disingenuous and selective presenta-

tion of data in its try to convince the city's residents that the municipal budget needed to be supplemented with more taxpayer money. The group called for the city to "live within its means and not spend more than it has." Ultimately, Measure C was convincingly defeated, with 932 votes in favor of it being cast, or 39.42 percent, and 1,432 votes against it, or 60.58 percent.

Subsequently, Betsy Adams departed as city manager and the city hired former Apple Valley Assistant City Manager Economic Development Director Ken Henderson, who was a Grand Terrace resident and former chairman of the Grand Terrace Budget Advisory Committee, to serve as interim city manager. He stayed in that position from January 2014 until January 2015.

In November 2014, a year after the defeat of Measure C, Grand Terrace turned Stanckiewitz out of office in favor of then-Councilwoman Darcy McNaboe. In the run-up to that election, the San Bernardino Sun's editorial board, whom Jim Smith of San Bernardino characterizes as "an independent voice," endorsed McNaboe over Stanckiewitz. In its endorsement of McNaboe, the Sun said she "is smart, tough but fair, and will make an excellent representative for the city in regional affairs while at the same time keeping the pulse of the community."

Also elected to the council in 2014 was

County Annexes 19,078 Square Miles And 368,000 Parcels Into Fire Assessment District

The trend toward layering never-before-imposed assessments on landowners to augment funding for fire department operations continued apace this week, with the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors voting 3-to-2 to expand Fire Prevention Zone Five to cover 19,078 square miles of unincorporated land in

the county.

Fire Protection Zone Five, known as FP-5, was originally formed more than a decade ago, as a construct for the county fire department to provide the desert communities of Silverlakes and Helendale with firefighting and emergency medical service. The creation of FP-5 carried with it the an-

nexation of Silverlakes and Helendale into a fire service assessment zone, which required that landowners within those two communities' confines pay yearly assessments to defray the cost of the fire department's operations therein.

In 2015, a majority of the San Bernardino City Council, frustrated with that bankrupt city's in-

ability going back several years to negotiate lower salary and benefits for the city's firefighters, used the strategy of closing out its municipal fire department and annexing the entirety of the city into FP-5 to cut costs. In so doing, all of that city's landowners were required to assume a \$147 per year parcel tax on top of existing

property taxes. In rapid succession over the next two years, the cities of Needles, Twentynine Palms and Upland likewise closed out their municipal or local fire departments and annexed their geographical confines into FP-5, likewise entailing a \$147-to-\$153 per parcel tax on their respective landowners.

This ploy miffed a

wide cross section of people in those communities in that the money those cities previously expended from their general funds to run their fire departments was kept by the cities and diverted to other uses, while the residents were forced to henceforth pay for a basic service – fire department operations

clusive. Also, I want to see a town council that reflects the diversity in Apple Valley."

Valenzuela said, "This council has put the safety and well-being of children second to that of profits. I know children are not allowed to vote, but they do grow up, and they will learn about how their elected officials regarded them. I want children to know that someone cared about them enough to speak up on their behalf. This council has not been checked enough by the people. I believe that the town council perceives the lack of people attending town council meetings as a sign that they are doing well. In reality, the residents of Apple Valley are preoccupied with responsibilities, distracted, or not knowledgeable of the actions of the council which would allow or motivate people to attend town council meetings."

She is qualified to hold the position of town council member, Valenzuela said, by both her skill set and sensitivity. "Given my legal education and experience, I can read and interpret laws that affect the residents of Apple Valley," she said. "Further, I understand the legal consequences of actions taken by the town council. I can issue-spot and problem solve, which are skills necessary for this position. It is a specialized skill to be able to pinpoint the actual issue. People are oftentimes blinded by selfish intentions or naïve beliefs and are unable to see the true

issue and therefore unable to provide a proper solution. This position is that of a civil servant. I have held other positions within the community that are to the sole service of others and I am therefore not new to this concept. I hold dear the idea that this position offers an opportunity for the people to have someone represent them."

She is distinguished from her opponents in the race, Valenzuela said, in that she has a demonstrated record of sincere concern for the community, which she has acted upon. "While I have attended town hall meetings throughout my life here in Apple Valley, upon my return home to Apple Valley from law school I became more vocal during town hall meetings," she said. "When I strongly disagreed with the town council's reasoning or lack of fact finding, I would speak up during public comments or during specific agenda items. I did not wait until it was politically convenient to show up to events and town hall meetings. I have been listening to Apple Valley residents and I have already taken it upon myself to speak up for those who are not currently represented. I am here in Apple Valley. I have been in Apple Valley. I am here at the town hall pulpit. I already speak up for my fellow residents, and I know I can do more as a council member."

The major issues facing the town, Valenzuela said, consist of "wasteful spending and government overstep by our current town council. Apple

Valley bought the golf course and other properties that are proving to be financial burdens. Now, the town council wants to acquire water rights. They believe they can lower costs, even though an economic report the town funded and a third party report both showed that this would not be the case for the consumer residents within the next decade. Meanwhile, the town council has already spent millions upon millions on litigation costs, and we are still in the thick of the litigation. Further, there is no precedent for towns or cities to be successful in such a type of case in California. Yes, water costs are high. However, this litigation is not how we fix the costs."

Valenzuela continued, "Council members are overstepping their authority. Governments should be transparent and remain in the confines of their duties and authority. It is not proper for governments, at any level, to take it upon themselves to bend the rules or stretch their authority. At times, the current council exhibits myopic behavior that leaves the citizens of Apple Valley to pay for their shortcomings. In the eminent domain case for water acquisition, the legal fees alone are millions. Other times, the council acted for no reason other than greed. For example, the current council allowed Verizon to install a 60 foot telecommunications pole in Mendel Park near the playground and classrooms of Mariana Elementary. The municipal code does not allow for such a telecommuni-

tions pole to be put there, given its proximity to homes and schools. Verizon needed to comport to five different zoning regulations and the pole's location required very large variances on four of those regulations. The current town council gave all the requested variances. It should be noted that the Apple Valley municipal code only authorizes the council to give "minor variances," and these were not minor variances. I believe the current council overstepped its authority in allowing Verizon to stick their pole where they wanted. Why would they do this? It has been made known that one of the council members rents land to Verizon and while he abstained from the initial vote for these variances, he did not abstain from voting to deny the appeal of the variance approval, which I believe was a conflict of interest and therefore a violation of his duty of loyalty. Further, when the council gave notice of the proposed telecommunication pole installation to those who lived in the 1,500 foot radius of the telecommunications pole installation site, which is prescribed by the municipal code, the council failed to realize that a majority of Mariana Elementary students are bused into school and therefore do not live within the 1,500 foot radius. Therefore, while the council's actions did comport with the law, they failed to maintain government transparency. If they are truly representing the people, the people should have actual knowledge of their actions."

In addition, Valenzuela said, "I am well aware that our town is facing other issues such as the increasing costs of water and the issue of keeping our lot sizes to a minimum of a half-acre. I too would like to see lower water costs, but done through reasonable and fiscally responsible means. I also support keeping our lot sizes to a minimum of a half-acre, as to maintain what Apple Valley is known for, our generous and beautiful lot sizes."

The town can easily redress the issues facing it, Valenzuela said. "The town council should act within its authority and should cease trying to acquire costly services, and it should sell burdensome properties," she said. "By disgorging financially burdensome properties and ceasing ongoing litigation, the town would thereby reduce costs."

Valenzuela said, "A majority of my government experience lies within the judicial branch of government. It is in that capacity that I have seen the effects of a properly written law and what happens when there is a law that is written too broadly or which perhaps does not solve a particular issue. Further, I have seen the importance of having elected officials truly represent the will of the people, for when they do not, obscure and special interests take precedence over the true needs of the people."

An Apple Valley native, Valenzuela has lived in Apple Valley, she said, "all my life with the exception of my undergraduate and

graduate studies. After law school, I came back home to Apple Valley." She attended Apple Valley High School. "I triple lettered in band, mock trial and water polo. I represented Apple Valley in Hawaii with AVHS Band when we received the Aloha Spirit Award and more at the Heritage Festival. I was on the executive board for the Friends for Life Club and a member of the National Honor Society among other clubs at Apple Valley High School. Go Sundevils! Before high school and throughout, I have proudly represented Apple Valley and I have been a part of various communities and organizations within Apple Valley."

Valenzuela double-majored in political science and philosophy and graduated with university honors from California State University Long Beach. She obtained her juris doctor from Thomas Jefferson School of Law in San Diego with a dean's scholarship.

She is currently employed by Apple Valley Unified School District as a substitute teacher.

Maintaining "the people of Apple Valley deserve the best," Valenzuela said, "I care about the residents of Apple Valley and I have demonstrated this to be true through my actions. I am running for town council because I know I could do much more for Apple Valley residents when I am not restricted to a three minute talking time limit or writing letters to departments within the town."

2012 and emerged from that status last year in significant measure by stiffing a large number of its creditors, and in 2016 dispensed with its 101 year-old city charter in favor of a redraft of how city government is being run. Under that new charter, San Bernardino will still have a seven-member city council, each representing a ward roughly equal to one seventh of the 62-square mile city geographically and a seventh of the city's 215,000 residents, along with a mayor who is elected at-large by all of the city's residents. In addition, the city will no longer have an elected city clerk and elected city attorney, and San Bernardino's municipal elections are to be held in even numbered years as opposed to the odd numbered years as was the case previously.

Thus, 2018 represents the first year an election under the city's new municipal governance blueprint is taking place. Ibarra has seized that opportunity wholeheartedly. She points out that "I have held several leadership roles since moving

to San Bernardino which have been instrumental in gaining knowledge of how the city works: I am a Neighborhood Watch block captain in which I look out for the safety and well-being of the people who live in this neighborhood and encourage others to start their own. I reactivated and have served as president, secretary, and treasurer for a local neighborhood association, bringing families together to learn about the city, beautifying our streets, and allowing a space for the community

scape problems, etc. I was also an appointee to the Fine Arts Commission. We were responsible for bringing in the annual arts festival, and the final locating of the Rosa Parks statue in our city. Due to my 'boots on the ground' approach and love for reaching out to the community, our parks and recreation department invited me to help them canvass the city, especially the Perris Hill Park area and local groups, to help us build the new KaBOOM playground this past May 2018."

Ibarra offered her opinion that "Voters should cast their votes as if they are 'hiring' the best candidate for the job. Warren Buffet once said, '...in looking for people to hire, you look for three qualities: integrity, intelligence, and energy.' I believe I can live up to that standard. With regard to integrity, My opponent stated on her primary's ballot designation that she was an elementary school teacher. It was confirmed that she erroneously misled the voters. We did our research. She does not hold a teaching credential with the State of California. You can verify this yourself at educator.ctc.ca.gov. She is an elementary school aide. 'Classified rotation' is her title listed on the school website: nsla.lewiscenter.

org. She is a recreational aide, not a teacher. Our city doesn't need dishonest 'leaders.' I used my actual job title because I do not want to misrepresent myself, especially in running for public office. In terms of intelligence, I earned my bachelor of arts degree from UCLA, an accredited 4-year college that is not easy to get into and even harder to graduate from, especially for first-generation college students like myself. As far as energy goes, I was already involved with improving the quality of life for the people who live in this city before I considered running for office. My opponent started doing neighborhood cleanups right after she submitted her candidacy document. She said she didn't do cleanups in the more than 14 years she's lived here because she was raising her children, yet she currently has three minors, so what makes this time around the exception? I'm the proven leader this city needs. I did not wait until deciding to run for office to do community cleanups.

Throughout the cleanups I have done, many parents have brought their children along with them. To me, this is an excellent way to serve as role models to the youth that follow behind us."

Ibarra said, "I genuinely care about commu-

nity engagement. I am an all-inclusive leader, translating at community meetings, responding to everyone's concerns, and encouraging everyone to participate in local politics and get involved in their respective neighborhoods. My opponent does not respond to English language questions from voters when they message her on social media and this concerns me as a community leader who has experienced voter apathy firsthand. It arose from years of elected officials not responding to their constituents. Let's not go down the same path. When people cast their vote in November, they should stop and think who is best qualified to represent Ward 2. We need someone with integrity, intelligence, and energy. I am focused, determined, and a proven leader. It's time to bring trust back in local politics with people who genuinely care about this city."

The major issues facing the city, Ibarra said, are "poor infrastructure and lack of public services. We have potholes, untrimmed trees and non-working or no street lights. We are not holding absentee landlords or slumlords accountable with our Crime Free Multi-Housing program, which was adopted in 2011. Our Neighborhood

Watch group sent letters to our elected and city leaders about the criminal activity lurking in our area and in these apartments, only to be disregarded until a fatal shooting occurred in February 2018. We need to talk to our neighboring cities and seek solutions to the 'undesirables' being dropped off into our city from their cities, resulting in crime, poverty, and homelessness. If these cities don't want to deal with them, it is time for San Bernardino to ask for monetary assistance so that we can provide the homeless on our streets with the services they need instead of depleting the money our city collects from local businesses and property owners, resulting in them receiving poor public services."

Continuing, Ibarra said, "We need to prioritize how the budget is being allocated. We should enforce the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program and collaborate with local groups and neighboring cities to tackle the complex issue of homelessness. We need to collaborate with all the non-profit groups in our city. We have many who want to help and if they have a 501(c)3, it would be great if they apply and get grants to help offset the depletion of city re-

**Grand Terrace

Four years on, the 2018 election is approaching and the political agitation in Grand Terrace has not ceased.

Last October, Brian Reinarz, who had been elected to the city council in 2016, abruptly resigned. After interviewing a handful of city residents who applied to replace Reinarz, the council chose to fill the gap with Henderson until a special election could be held this November to determine who will complete the last two years of Reinarz' term. Henderson, McConnell and educator Jeff Allen are now competing in that race.

McNaboe is up for reelection this year. She is being challenged by Councilwoman Sylvia Robles, who was first elected to the council in 2012 and was reelected in 2016. The race is a replay of the 2010 council race in Grand Terrace, when McNaboe and Robles slugged it out. McNaboe prevailed in that contest 1,772 votes or 50.64 percent to Robles' 1,727 votes or 49.36 percent.

Also being contested is the position now held by Wilson, who is seeking reelection. Challenging him is Greg Batla.

An alliance, of sorts, has emerged among Robles, Wilson and McConnell. If their political consortium can pull off a hat trick so that Wilson stays in office, McConnell displaces Henderson and Robles ousts McNaboe, they will have the votes to put their reformist platform in place.

McConnell has been a constant fixture at city council meetings going back for a decade-and-a-half. He has served as a political bellwether of sorts, as the candidates he has historically opposed, such as Stanckewitz, usually end up losing. What remains to be seen is whether he can convert the momentum he has shown a talent for mustering against

incumbents in the past can be harnessed for success in his own elective effort this year, and, if he is elected, whether he can effectuate once in office the reforms he is advocating now and has advocated in the past as an outsider.

By default, McConnell's opposition to Stanckewitz put him in the McNaboe camp four years ago. But McNaboe has done little to differentiate herself from the patterns of the past. Indeed, like the mayor who preceded Stanckewitz, Maryetta Ferré, she is herself wedded to a primary element of the Grand Terrace Establishment. Just as Frank Ferré was a board member and board president of the Riverside-Highland Water Company, so too is McNaboe's husband, Jim, a board member and board president of the Riverside-Highland Water Company. The Riverside Highland Water Company was incorporated as a mutual water company by the State of California in 1898, and as such has provided domestic and irrigation water to the entirety of what is now the City of Grand Terrace, portions of the City of Colton and unincorporated areas of the counties of San Bernardino and Riverside, including Highgrove, which immediately borders Grand Terrace at the San Bernardino/Riverside County Line. Pre-existing the incorporation of the City of Grand Terrace by 80 years, the Riverside-Highland Water Company exists as a primary institution of the community, such that those affiliated with it are by definition establishment figures.

The city and Riverside-Highland came to loggerheads a few years back over the city's insistence that the water utility pay a franchise fee it has avoided since the city's incorporation in 1978. A majority of city officials, feeling the city had the right to be reimbursed for the cost of having to repair or alter streets and sidewalks in the aftermath of excavations to repair, replace

or upgrade water pipes, and emboldened by a Supreme Court ruling that held cities are at liberty to impose franchise fees on utility companies that have easements pertaining to the use of municipal property, sued the water company. Ultimately, that suit was settled without going to trial when the Riverside Highland Water Company agreed to pay to the city an annual franchise fee of \$23,000. Nevertheless, many Grand

Terrace residents felt that Darcy McNaboe, perhaps owing to the consideration that her husband was the board chairman with Riverside-Highland, was not as forceful in asserting the city's rights as she should have been.

Steve Berry, who represented the avant-garde in 2009 in the tussle with Schwab's old guard, has moved on from Grand Terrace at this point but has become something of an elder statesman in the city, as the wounds his sharp division and rivalry with Schwab tore open have healed over and many of the older members of the community who were so prominent in the old guard have passed away. In some of their public utterances, McNaboe and the city manager that was hired under her watch, Harold Duffy, have indicated they have conferred with Berry from time to time.

In addition to the perception that McNaboe has an allegiance to the elite establishment and the Old Guard that is not in keeping with the larger interests of Grand Terrace's general population, her husband's control of another more recently created Grand Terrace institution has put her at odds with some of her constituents, as well. The

Facebook 92313 Public Group has become a popular on-line forum for residents of Grand Terrace to exchange information about the city and discuss issues they feel impassioned about. While the group as of this week sports 3,906 members, it was created by Jim McNaboe, the mayor's husband, and is a closed group. He is the administrator of the site and, as is his right, allows only those he approves of to participate in the exchanges. As administrator he can either disallow entirely or take down any postings of which he disapproves. This has generated some resentment among those who feel he has censored ideas or suggestions that run contrary to his wife's political positions. Many feel this has foreclosed open dialogue about issues of public concern in Grand Terrace.

Darcy McNaboe has sought to keep things upbeat. On her campaign website, she has stated her positions and touts herself as a champion of Grand Terrace's residents and "the most experienced" candidate. Saying she "genuinely cares" about Grand Terrace, McNaboe said that as a "twenty-five year resident of Grand Terrace, small business owner, dedicated to community service, active in the community and running for re-election for mayor, I'm asking for your continued support. I have provided proven leadership in the private sector and as your mayor for the past four years. Grand Terrace has had difficult times, but I believe our community is turning the corner and looking towards a more prosperous future."

Saying she is "dedicated" to community involvement, McNaboe said, "I remain dedicated to this community and all the residents. I believe that our future prosperity depends on the dedication of every resident of Grand Terrace. I remain committed to keeping Grand Terrace the most desirable and safe community to live, work and play in."

She obliquely rejected suggestions of elitism and having closed herself off from input from citizens who have differences with her over the direction of the city and its management, as well as the charges of censorship leveled at her as a consequence of her husband's selective deletions of postings to the 92313 Facebook Public Group page. She said she offers "representation for every resident on every issue. Your voice is heard," she insisted.

Robles, her rival in the race, suggested that McNaboe is constantly turning a deaf ear to the city's residents who have ideas that do not line up with her own about the best way for the city to be managed and directed. She said the city should facilitate rather than repress the expression of ideas.

A case in point, Robles said, consists of the manipulation of the 92313 Facebook site. "A sore point for a number of us, is the mayor's social media abuse," Robles said. "She and her husband host the 92313 Facebook page, a closed group of 3,000 plus affiliated Grand Terrace folks. This page has had all members of the city council as members. This is not illegal but is not a best practice. Numerous city attorneys have said it is unethical and the law has not caught up to social media." Robles' reference is to the possibility that the exchanges between city council members on the site could result in a violation of the Ralph M. Brown Act, California's open public meeting law which prohibits a quorum of any governing board, such as a city council, from discussing issues that are eventually voted upon in any forum other than a legally agendized public meeting.

"In recent years the topic of crime has been raised on the site, leading the mayor to request a council workshop," said Robles. "As more demands for greater sheriff protection grew, we had another council community meeting that

lead to citizens petitioning to bring forth a revenue measure for more sheriff services. The mayor blocks discussion on tax measures for enhanced sheriff services, including sales tax that would likely not greatly impact residents. This is a circus. To add to it, we must endure the tyranny of Jim McNaboe, who is the 92313 moderator and owner of the Facebook page, and board member of Chamber of Commerce and Riverside Highland Water Company, who calls us essentially idiots for seeking franchise fees."

Robles said, "Great decisions require a great forum of ideas. As your next mayor, I will work to set the framework for taking care of city business. Your elected representatives must have the best forum to tackle multifaceted policy issues. Grand Terrace, while incorporated 40 years ago, still struggles with bad policy decisions from 1978. We incorporated on a shaky foundation of revenues. For decades we relied on redevelopment agency funds to keep the city afloat. Feeling flush with redevelopment agency revenues, the city entered the child care business only to find itself subsidizing child care operations with general fund money. In the process, we racked up over \$300,000 in pension debt and over \$300,000 in general fund costs. The city, unable or unwilling to recognize that redevelopment agency funding has been abolished, held on to redevelopment agency bonds issued for \$29 million and kept paying its debt and interest payments to the tune of over \$1 million per year since 2011. During my last six years as an elected council member, I took the lead to cut pension debt by eliminating non-core city programs. Child care was transferred to the Family Services Association of Riverside. We hope to announce another child care provider in the coming weeks."

designated vice mayor. "The reason he [Eaton] gave for asking me to run was my way of looking at things. He was a calm person. He always kept the council on an even keel. He thought I could do the same. I believe I can do that. His whole family is supporting me. Over the last

four years, on those occasions when Paul was not there, I have been running the meetings. I was the acting mayor for two years."

Following Eaton's resignation, the city council appointed Eaton's wife, Ginger, to fill out the remainder of her husband's term. Ginger Eaton has now endorsed Raft in her run for mayor.

In November, Raft, who has been on the

council since 1992, will face another member of the council in the mayoral contest, John Dutrey, as well as Sousan Elias and Kelly Thomas Smith.

"We have made improvements in a lot of areas," Raft said of the city. "Crime is down. As a council, we have improved the local housing situation. John and I have pretty much done the same things. In a

little over the last five years, almost every single lot has been built or is now being built on. On the south side we are seeing a lot of infill development. We lost Cardenas [a local grocery store] but now we are getting them to come back. We have had a lot of great development up at the north end, the revitalization of the Montclair Plaza, the Paseos, and we are getting some industrial

around Arrow Highway. We have the Arrow Station [rail and bus depot] in north Montclair."

She said the city will soon see a "European Style" development that will entail, she said, "businesses and shops on the ground floor and one, two or maybe three stories of residential housing above. Near that we have the Gold Line coming in, which I am told will run all the way

into downtown Los Angeles and will cost passengers just \$1.75 for a one-way ticket. We will be seeing that completed and hopefully will see the Gold Line extended to the east, to Ontario Airport and beyond."

With nearly all of the developable property in Montclair having been built upon, Raft said the next logical place for the council to turn its at-

done them to return to at-large elections during the 1990s. He is standing for election against Paul Barich, who is an incumbent councilman previously elected at-large, along with Joe Richardson and Mike Saifie.

He stands apart from his rivals, Estrada said, by virtue of "my diverse work experience and 23 years of management in government and public education. I've earned the 'hands on' public safety experience as a firefighter and operations supervisor for an ambulance provider in the greater Los Angeles metropolitan area. This is important because I have first responder experience helping the homeless and mental health patients by administering emergency medical care. I have management experience working in education and city government. That includes management experience at USC in the Division of Business Affairs and now with a local community college district. I'm bilingual, served on boards, commissions, and gained the management experience in government to accomplish the expectations, objectives, and goal of serving others."

The major challenges currently facing the city, Estrada said, are "crime, the growing homeless problem, balancing the budget, maintaining infrastructure (especially

our water systems), and growth as it relates to housing and public safety."

He said these problems "can be remedied by operating a fiscally sound budget, maintaining staffing levels in public safety, and collaborating with regional and state agencies in helping the homeless. Through a coordinated effort, we need to help the homeless get back on their feet and into housing, not sustain them on the street. In regards to infrastructure, the council approved increases to our utilities statements to sustain, improve, and enhance our water systems. As a city council, we need to assure those funds are effectively utilized.

More Americans are shopping online, and brick and mortar stores are taking a financial hit, with some big box stores facing bankruptcy, thus hurting the revenue our city takes in. So, one of my goals is to attract additional auto dealerships and businesses that can enhance our sales tax revenue and sustain our city long term."

Estrada said, "We're already paying for the existing services through our general fund as cataloged in the city budget and fees associated with City Hall. Additional revenues exist, although defined, in state and federal funding through grants and matching funds. So as a city governmental entity, we need to actively seek and apply for that funding stream. Our city will continue to receive additional property taxes as the city continues to grow with new home construction in

East Redlands. As a city government, though, we need to be customer friendly in accommodating new business and relax the 'funding mechanisms' known as fees, surcharges, and higher operating costs. We need to attract new business altogether and have an effective strategic action plan to address our city services consistently."

He has sufficient familiarity with government operations to hit the ground running once he assumes office, Estrada said. "My government experience started in 1990 as a college intern with the City of Pasadena, Department of Public Works," Es-

trada said. "Since then I've had the opportunity to serve on city, and community, boards and commissions since 1994. As important, serving as an auxiliary firefighter with a city government in the San Gabriel Valley gave me the first-hand knowledge and experience working in a public safety environment."

Estrada has lived in Redlands since 2010. "We sold our home in the San Gabriel Valley and are proud active homeowners here in Redlands," he said.

Having grown up in unincorporated East Los Angeles and completed his K-to-12 education attending Los Angeles

sources. The reason I say non-profits should apply for grants is because our city still has a lot of financial instability and it would be best if the grants are being administered by the non-profits themselves, with the city providing support. We need to make sure that money will go specifically towards the people who need the help. We have groups who do not have a 501(c)3 status but voluntarily assist without asking the city for funding. The school district encourages its students to volunteer in order to graduate. We have local business owners who also want to see this city thrive and are willing to assist. We need to collaborate with all sorts of groups so that we can tackle the issues we are facing, each focusing in

on their strengths. Public services should be provided to our citizens instead of paying for consultants and out-of-town developers who over-promise and under-deliver. If elected as a public servant, I would like to make sure that the taxes our citizens pay are being used solely to maintain an adequate level of service that every citizen deserves.

As a former commissioner, I was able to see how the Housing and Urban Development money our city was getting was being mismanaged. This was money that could have been used to revitalize our city. Our city commissioners are integral in overseeing

Ibarra holds a bachelor of arts degree in Chicano studies from UCLA and is employed at a local non-profit: Neighborhood Housing Services of the Inland Empire.

She said, "I want the best for the city and it will be up to our voters to decide which one of the two candidates wins this November. I have been trying to be a voice for the people who live in this city and I would be honored to serve the people of San Bernardino. I have vision, a plan, and a platform to make our city the All-American City it once was."

property, equipment or personnel, to assist federal officials with immigration law enforcement. The law prohibits local law enforcement officers from asking detainees or arrestees about their immigration status, giving federal immigration authorities access to interview a person in custody or assisting them in immigration enforcement. The sanctuary city concept, which parallels Senate Bill 54, pertains to local officials declaring their municipalities to be illegal alien friendly zones wherein local law enforcement would stand down and not assist federal authorities in the enforcement of immigration and customs laws, and illegal immigrants would be provided with social assistance to be able to sustain themselves.

The Rialto rally was also heavily attended by protesters against Senate Bill 54 such as We The People Rising, which characterizes Senate Bill 54 as a violation of federal law. Negrete spoke out with regard to Gomez's Rialto sojourn immediately, going on record to say Ms. Gomez was not speaking for the City of Victorville or its city council, that most certainly she wasn't speaking for him, that he personally disagreed with what she was doing, that he considered Senate Bill 54 to be treasonous and that neither Victorville nor any other California city should become a sanctuary for illegal aliens. Noting federal law takes precedent over state law, Negrete said Gomez had acted improperly. "Local officials are expected to support the rule of law," he stated.

During his more than three-and-a-half year tenure on the city council, there were numerous manifestations of Negrete hewing to the conservative side of the political divide, a common thread of which was his stated belief that law and order should prevail.

In addition to reiterating his campaign theme of reprioritizing the city's budget to shore up public safety in general, he called for further crackdowns on crime and criminals, even as the State of California appeared to be moving in the opposite direction with Proposition 47, which reduced some so-called non-violent crime from felonies to misdemeanors. In criticizing Proposition 47, Negrete emphasized that "break-ins" or burglaries might not necessarily remain nonviolent, particularly if a homeowner or business owner ended up confronting the burglar. He decried the reduction of felonies to misdemeanors and the softening of laws, which he said invited criminals to reoffend.

This year, Victorville was among dozens of cities in Southern California, including at least eight in San Bernardino County which either endorsed or gave serious discussion toward endorsing by means of an amicus brief the stance the City of Huntington Beach took in defiance of Senate Bill 54. That council discussion, which occurred on May 15, was undertaken at Negrete's behest. His intent was to convince his council colleagues, among whom there are two other Republicans, to at least file an amicus brief or preferably join with Huntington Beach as a plaintiff in the suit. During that discussion Negrete asserted that "California is becoming a third-world country" and opined that the majority of the state's legislature was rooted in "anti-American" and "stupid" ideologies. In contrast, his colleague, Councilwoman Blanca Gomez, characterized Negrete, because of his opposition to Senate Bill 54, as a "brown Nazi."

Ultimately, however, though the majority sentiment on the council was that the California legislature was out of line in seeking to thwart federal authority, the panel collectively decided to allow the matter to play out in the courts without any official input

from the City of Victorville.

At times, Negrete has merged the issues of immigration law liberalization and sentence reduction, as when he said that allowing sanctuaries to exist in California "impedes federal agents in their effort to keep illegal immigrant felons off the streets." In December, he said, "When you reduce a felony to a misdemeanor and you've got homeless people violating all kinds of laws... those laws really don't count as much as they used to."

While not alone among Latino politicians in California to have questioned Senate Bill 54, the sanctuary for immigration law offenders concept or liberalization of immigration policy in general or specific, Negrete is certainly among the most, if not the most, outspoken on the topic.

Negrete's political base at present is in Victorville, where 47.8 percent or the registered voters in the 123,700 population city identify as Hispanic. Victorville is also centrally positioned within San Bernardino County's High Desert, which is one of the last bastions of Republicanism in the State. In this way, Negrete's political future appeared promising. An eventual berth within California's statehouse, either as a member of the Assembly or Senate or both was clearly within the realm of possibility for him. And given his trailblazing status as a conservative Republican Latino in the Golden State, neither was it unthinkable that Negrete might find his way into Congress and make his mark on the national stage as iconic member of the GOP. To some, Negrete seemed like he might be that one charismatic Hispanic politician, who, like Moses leading the Hebrews out of slavery in Egypt, might point a pathway for Latinos to make their exodus from the Democratic Party to the promised land of Republicanism.

But along the way, Negrete had to remain in office to keep his political persona in play.

This year, having been elected to the Victorville City Council four years ago, he was due to run for reelection, which he did. And he seemed destined for reelection, given the consideration that the other incumbent due for reelection this year had chosen not to seek reelection, that Negrete had the power of incumbency and a larger campaign war chest than any of his competitors, and that the field of 16 candidates for Victorville City Council was the largest in terms of the number of those running in any of San Bernardino County's municipal races in 2018.

But at 5:46 a.m. on Monday October 15 during National Public Radio's Morning Edition broadcast, which is heard virtually everywhere throughout the United States as well as in many foreign countries, a five-minute report on Negrete put together by Tom Dreisbach and Libby Denkmann of the Southern California National Public Radio affiliate KPCC was propagated across the airwaves. Dreisbach and Denkmann dredged up an incident from almost a decade ago, a Valentine's Day lovers' spat on February 14, 2009 in which a disagreement between Negrete and his then-girlfriend, whom he would later marry, grew heated and then turned physical. The couple was on 7th Street in Victorville just after 1 a.m., according to a San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department Report, which reads, in part, "Negrete struck victim in face. The victim ran and Negrete chased and forced victim into the vehicle."

Negrete was arrested on suspicion of kidnapping and battery, and held in lieu of \$250,000 bail for four days. Despite his girlfriend's expressed preference that no charges in the case be pursued, the San Bernardino County District Attorney's Office acted upon the sheriff's department report and filed charges.

On February 18, 2009, Negrete was arraigned before Judge Patrick Singer on a Penal

Code Section 270 felony charge of kidnapping, two Penal Code Section 243 misdemeanor charges of battery on a spouse or cohabitant and a Penal Code 374 misdemeanor charge of inflicting corporal injury on a spouse or cohabitant. Six days later, Negrete came before Judge Bridgid McCann on February 24, 2009, at which point three of the four charges – the felony kidnapping and the two misdemeanor battery on a spouse – were dismissed. Simultaneously, the misdemeanor inflicting corporal injury charge was amended to a felony, and Negrete pleaded guilty to it.

According to the KPCC/National Public Radio report, "Judge Bridgid McCann stated during one court hearing, 'alcohol was one of the main factors in the offense being committed.'"

McCann sentenced Negrete to 120 days in jail and three years probation, with an option for work release. He was required to attend a class for domestic batterers weekly for a year and refrain from the use of alcohol during his probation and submit to periodic tests administered by his probation officer to detect whether he had been using alcohol. Negrete served 69 days of the 120 day sentence in jail, including the ten days served between his arrest and his plea.

Dreisbach's and Denkmann's report dwelled upon the contrast between Negrete's public utterances with regard to cracking down on lawlessness and his own criminal conviction as well as Negrete's professed opposition to Proposition 47, which reduces many classes of felonies to misdemeanors, and a petition Negrete made to the court subsequent to his conviction have the charge upon which he was convicted reduced from a felony to a misdemeanor.

Negrete appeared at several probation review hearings before judges Margaret Powers, William Jefferson Powell, Larry Allen and Miriam Morton in 2009

and 2010. On January 19, 2011, Judge Eric Nakata heard a Penal Code 17(b) motion filed on Negrete's behalf by his attorney, Dave Leicht. Penal Code 17(b) allows a judge to reduce a felony conviction to a misdemeanor based on a host of issues, including the defendant's behavior, adherence to the terms of probation, criminal history and the severity of the offense. The district attorney's office did not object to the reduction of the charge to a misdemeanor but protested Leicht's request for early termination of Negrete's probation. Leicht told Judge Nakata that Negrete took personal responsibility for what he had done but that the felony conviction and his client's probation status was making it difficult for Negrete to get work and function as a civilian contractor at Fort Irwin. Judge Nakata consented to the reduction of the charge to a misdemeanor and, over the district attorney's office's objection, ordered the termination of Negrete's probation.

The KPCC/National Public Radio spot on Negrete used the term "irony" in suggesting that there was some degree of hypocrisy in Negrete's strident anti-crime and pro-public safety rhetoric and his own actions "Negrete has been much less outspoken about his own felony conviction," according to Dreisbach and Denkmann. They noted that in his response to KPCC, Negrete referred

Moreover, Robles said, during her tenure on the council the city had "settled the City of Colton wastewater lawsuit and gained \$400,000 in one-time general fund money and \$300,000 per annum for the wastewater fund." She further

worked toward and voted, she said, to "establish a community benefits fund to fund extra patrols, sports leagues, and senior/youth services. I also fought to keep the remaining \$20,000 in our Fiscal Year 18/19 budget. This money has already helped the Grand Terrace High School Titan football team and helped provide a summer library read-

ing program. Many residents wish to increase sheriff protection. We had hoped a community-led ballot measure would qualify for the November ballot to consider a parcel tax. The fact now is that under a complicated hearing process, the San Bernardino County Fire Protection District is working to add a \$157 per parcel tax to all Grand Terrace proper-

ties. Clearly, rising pension costs are driving the agenda."

Robles said the city needs to be more circumspect in making its spending commitments. "Some candidates will say they are against new taxes," Robles said. "My opponent voted in 2011 to saddle the city with \$29 million in redevelopment agency bonds which included buying a

lot for a dog park. I actively supported the development of a dog park with park fee revenues. I don't believe the land should have been paid for with bonds with huge interest payments."

Robles said, "I have no power to raise your taxes, only the voters can approve by ballot measure any new taxes. Redevelopment agencies were abolished in

to the 2009 Valentines Day incident as a "family matter" and "a misunderstanding." The report quoted Negrete as telling the reporters "Obviously, we are still together, and the issues within our marriage have been

resolved. On the advice of my counsel, I entered into a plea deal which resulted in my agreement to plead guilty to certain charges." Negrete further stated that he and his wife "have sought each other's forgiveness and addressed the issues that led to this unfortunate incident. Those issues are now in the past and nothing precludes me from holding public office." Negrete suggested, according to Dreisbach and Denkman "that

reporting on his conviction was politically motivated."

The KPCC/National Public Radio report said "Until now, there does not appear to be any news coverage of Negrete's arrest or conviction" and that City of Victorville officials appeared to have known nothing of the matter.

It has been suggested by some that the intent behind the broadcast and its timing was to dim Negrete's re-electoral hopes

in this year's election and derail his promising career as a Republican Latino political leader in California. Indeed, the lead-in to the report and the report itself appear to have winged Negrete, who in the last two weeks has gone into a virtual cocoon, at the very height of the political season when his campaign would benefit most from him being out on the hustings. He missed a recent candidates forum, which the KPCC/

National Public Radio report suggested was a consequence of Negrete seeking to avoid public exposure in the heat of revelations contained in the broadcast. A recurrent criticism of National Public Radio is that it evinces a liberal bias in that it appears to promote Democrats over Republicans, and embraces so-called progressive or liberal causes. That bias, some have suggested, played a part in the current contretemps.

Musser-Lopez Asking Voters To Elect Her To Represent State's Largest Senate District from front page

tion of the Mojave Desert, the district includes the San Bernardino County communities of Twentynine Palms, Yucca Valley, Barstow and Needles, as well as communities in Kern, and Tulare counties, including Ridgecrest, Taft, Tehachapi, Barstow, Tulare, Visalia and much of Bakersfield.

Musser-Lopez's matchup this year against Shannon Grove, a Kern County native who was a California Assemblywoman representing the 32nd and 34th Assembly districts from 2010 until 2016, is her second effort to gain entrance to the upper chamber of the California legislature. In 2014, she ran against Jean Fuller, the soon-to-be termed-out incumbent in the 16th Senate District.

Some see Musser-Lopez's electoral quest as a daunting task that will require a Herculean effort to overcome both political and geographical challenges. The 16th is the most sparsely populated of all of California's Senate districts, with some population-intensive urban centers scattered at varying intervals throughout it. Most of that population is outside of Musser-Lopez's East Mojave bailiwick, and the East Mojave is outside of Grove's former Assembly districts, which were located around the more heavily populated areas surrounding Bakersfield. Grove thus enjoys a greater degree of name recognition throughout most of the district than does Musser-Lopez.

Moreover, Grove is a Republican and Musser-Lopez a Democrat. While the district does have a few Democratic enclaves, on balance in the district overall the Republicans enjoy an advantage in terms of larger voter registration numbers than do the Democrats.

Those putative advantages are not as overwhelming as they might appear, Musser-Lopez said. She noted that she established name recognition throughout the district four years ago in her run against Fuller. And while conceding that more of her would-be constituents are in with the GOP than with her party, she points out that it may behoove the residents of the 16th to elect a Democrat rather than a Republican to represent them in the statehouse, given the degree to which the Democrats dominate Sacramento.

"With a supermajority of Democrats in the Senate, we need a strong, effective, accomplished leader who can advocate for the people and the needs of our district," Musser Lopez said. "I don't need to reach across the aisle... I am already on the side capable of bringing state funds here. I will fight to bring improved public social programs not controlled by corporations, but governed by the vote and the voice of the people. My opponent, as a Bakersfield assemblywoman for 6 years, wasted time and precious public dollars and resources introducing far right, 'tea party' ideas like shuttering the state legislature to three months a year. She concerns herself more with her corporate contributors than the needs of the workers. The last thing we need are greedy CEOs controlling every aspect of our lives and wages so low that it forces young people to work two jobs just to own an old used car."

Musser-Lopez said she believes a significant portion of the district's residents can more readily identify with her than her opponent. Much of the 16th lies within or at the outlying periphery of the San Joaquin Valley, which is not just the most intensive agricultural district in California but the breadbasket of the world.

"My folks owned a dairy farm and milk product distribution business in Southern Cali-

fornia that my grandfather started in the 1920s with just two cows," said Musser-Lopez. "They built the business so that eventually they had a thousand cows and established their own bottling and ice cream plant to accommodate their production. From a family of ten children, we learned to help out on the production end of things, meanwhile gaining an aptitude for the management side of business. We raised much of our own feed, making silage from field corn, and had a citrus grove. As a kid I picked lemons along with the laborers for a side job. Growing up, I read the journals and literature that came in our mail pertaining to farming and California agriculture. My father was farm bureau president in San Bernardino County for about 10 years and I learned from listening to him discuss political matters on the kitchen phone."

Musser-Lopez said she believes she can better serve the needs of the residents of the 16th than Grove. In that regard, Musser-Lopez said she is far better equipped to ensure the availability, delivery and quality of water, for both domestic and agricultural use throughout the district.

"My opponent's legislative record proves that she could care less about water issues," Musser-Lopez said. "She should not be allowed anywhere near the water issue. She blames drought on 'God's punishment for abortion legislation.' In San Bernardino County, we have struggled to fight off privatization of East Mojave Desert groundwater by a giant corporation. The same thing is going on in the Central Valley. When corporations own the water, they control life. There have been recent "tweaks" in the law that have allowed this corporate water privatization to happen. I know where those tweaks are and I know how to write legislation that can reverse this trend."

Musser-Lopez continued, "I know what to

do to reverse the trend of unfair water delivery practices. I know how to write legislation and get the job done. Northern California greed factors into a lot of this. The focus is on water sales in the north and deliveries to the south. Meanwhile we are getting seasonal deluges of rain down here on the south coast and insufficient water catchment, not enough desalination and recycling plants, and a leaky infrastructure. We need more waterworks infrastructure in the Southland that would relieve pressure on Senate District 16's south Central Valley where the aquifer has been severely depleted to the point of major subsidence and suffered industrial and agricultural contamination, creating a crazy situation where communities at the base of the Sierra Mountains are forced to truck in clean water."

Musser Lopez said, "Two of my top priorities are affordable higher education leading to well-paying careers – not just jobs – and affordable healthcare for all. I will work with the legislature to navigate a pathway for a state MediCare program that creates well-paying careers while cutting insurance costs. I will work to bring a world-class public school system, pre-school through college, by attracting the best teachers with competitive pay scales."

She said, "A priority of mine is getting UCLA to extend its medical school over to Cal State

San Bernardino. That area has one of the highest, if not the highest, densities of air pollution in the country causing lung disease and cancer. We need to train more doctors and health care professionals to address these specific needs, and find a cure for Valley Fever, a deadly disease caused by mold spores in the soil. Everyone from farm workers and gardeners to archaeologists are susceptible."

A product of the University of California System, where she attended, UCLA and graduated from UC Riverside, Musser Lopez majored in archeology and then put those skills to work in the field. "As a former federal land management employee, having worked for the Bureau of Land Management, the Fish and Wildlife Service and the U.S. Forest Service and in my own consulting business, I have worked on a variety of teams," she said.

"After writing impact assessments on a diversity of projects, I acquired extensive knowledge of a multitude of political issues, public and private projects, issues and topics pertinent to Senate District 16, including the military and native American reservations, monuments and parks, private lands and uses such as oil and gas leasing, ranching and recreation. With this background and writing skills, I am well equipped to evaluate and understand the interface of federal, state and local law and to prepare leg-

islation that will benefit the people of Senate District 16."

Musser Lopez emphasizes that she defies the classic stereotype of a "tax and spend" Democrat, saying she believes that the people of San Bernardino County were wronged when the board of supervisors added a fire tax to their parcels without their vote. "Isn't the outrage of taxation without a vote why we fought off the English?" she asked, rhetorically.

Musser-Lopez said, "There should be a means for the state to generate revenue to sponsor public programs. I have been asked if I am for the gas tax. I must say that I am for something different than a gas tax. Water and other minerals, including oil, are a California resource and I agree that discoverers should get a 'finder's fee' but they should never own forever these public resources."

She said the state should own the minerals, set the price of the commodity and establish the state's cut of the profit. Actions akin to this, she asserted, could potentially end the question of taxing truckers and commuters at the gas station. She predicted that it would also reduce the petroleum industry's profit incentive. "Then perhaps California can lead the rest of the world in finally getting down to the business of clean energy powered transportation," she said.

– that had historically been a municipal feature. The only exception to this was Twentynine Palms, where the water district operated the fire department. The cities' pocketing of that money and the imposition of the newly created assessments was seen as an expansion of those cities' and the county's taxing

authority. That ran counter to the principle in the California Constitution of requiring that any new tax first be approved by a majority of those to bear the burden of paying that tax.

Those cities and the county maneuvered around this requirement by having the assessments ratified not by a traditional vote but rather by what is called a "protest process" in which each landowner was given mailed notice of a one-month "protest period," during which

the county would accept letters protesting the creation of the assessment district. Each such letter was tallied as a vote against the annexation and assessment imposition. Each landowner who did not deliver a letter of protest was deemed to be in support of the annexation and assessments being levied, and a vote ratifying folding those cities into Fire Prevention Zone Five was cast on their behalf.

In all of those previ-

ous annexations going back to 2015 there was considerable discontent among landowners and residents, but sufficient protest letters were not generated to prevent the annexations. In the case of the Upland annexation, the neighboring unincorporated community of San Antonio Heights was included. In response, a number of residents banded together under the aegis of the San Antonio Homeowners Association and sued

the City of Upland and the County of San Bernardino over the forced annexation. That suit is yet wending its way through the litigious process.

Using County Fire Chief Mark Hartwig's recommendation to annex the 19,078 square miles of unincorporated county land and some 368,000 landowners into FP-5 to address a \$29 million budget shortfall as a justification, the board of supervisors in June voted 3-2 to initiate the process to expand the zone. Those supporting the annexation were supervisors Josie Gonzales, James Ramos and Curt Hagman. Opposing it were supervisors Jan-

ice Rutherford and Robert Lovingood.

Each of the annexed parcel owners will pay \$157 per year, and county officials calculate the assessments will generate \$26.9 million annually.

At the board of supervisors meeting on Tuesday, county officials said 11,472 verified protest letters, entailing objections by 3.18 percent of the more than 368,000 property owners and representing 1.97 percent of the assessed land value involved had been received. Had 25 percent of the impacted landowners registered protests, by law a traditional vote would have needed to be conducted.

If more than 50 percent had weighed in against the annexation, no annexation would have taken place.

According to Hartwig, in September the county fire department mailed notices of the pending annexation to more than 368,000 property owners countywide. With the 25 percent protest threshold not having been met, the board was legally entitled to ratify the annexation. Before it did so, on Tuesday the board heard four hours of input from the public, all of which inveighed against proceeding with the annexations.

Ultimately, however, Supervisor Hagman made a motion to

proceed with the annexation, seconded by Supervisor Gonzales. Supervisor James Ramos then joined with them in casting an affirmative vote, the annexation passing by the same 3-to-2 margin by which the process was initiated in June.

The Red Brennan Group, an organization, named after the late government reform advocate Kiernan "Red" Brennan, last week had filed a petition with the San Bernardino County Superior Court for an injunction seeking to halt the board of supervisors from proceeding with the annexation process. That petition was denied by the court. After Tues-

day's vote, Tom Murphy, the official spokesman for the Red Brennan Group, told the *Sentinel* it is the organization's contention that the annexation being effectuated without an actual vote is a violation of the California Constitution. "In response to the County of San Bernardino's violation of the California Constitution, the Red Brennan Group will continue its court challenge to FP-5," Murphy said. tention is to enhancing community safety. "As I have been campaigning, I have heard people everywhere remark on speeding, and how cars are running red lights and stop signs," she said. "That may be the biggest headache for Montclair. We have to figure out something and I don't mind asking other cities how they have handled these problems. I'm not above asking for help. One of the things we can do is get the public involved and get the police involved and put our heads together and try to come up with a solution. We used to have motorcycle cops, but they retired or were promoted and never replaced. Our police chief was a motor-

cycle cop. I'd be in favor of bringing motorcycle patrols back. Officers are able to see things on their bikes that they are not in a position to see when they are in their patrol cars."

When she was queried as to how the city should generate more revenue to provide basic services and other enhancements, Raft said, "A lot of people are talking about the marijuana issue and allowing dispensaries into the city. That is one possible source of revenue." She sounded less than enthusiastic about that option, however.

"We can't just up and tax people, because they have to approve it," she said. "I think the best way is for us to try and keep businesses coming in. We do need more revenue, because our payments [for pensions] to the California Public Employees Retirement System keep going up

and up. They expect us to keep up with those payments. That is bankrupting some cities. The only solution I see is we need to bring in more sales tax producing businesses."

Raft said, "We have improved much of what is going on in the city, simply by passing the right ordinances."

With regard to her current electoral effort and the opportunity it presents for her to vault from the city council, of which she has been a member since 1992, to the mayoralty, she acknowledged that she is now working hard to make that a reality. "I am campaigning all over town," she said. "It really is exhausting, but I keep going. I have a lot of people who know me and know my family. I have a lot of supporters. I am grateful for that."

She said she has no particular rivalry with

Dutrey, who is perceived by many as her primary opposition in the campaign. Both came onto the city council at the same time in 1992 and have been reelected together ever since. There has been substantial harmony between them in their voting patterns over the years, and both were last elected to the council in 2016, so that both are now midterm in their council positions. Thus, if one wins in November, the other will yet be a member of the council for two more years. She insisted she

would be able to be gracious in defeat and magnanimous in victory, and continue to work side-by-side with Dutrey, no matter what the voters decide. In sizing up how she is distinguished from Dutrey, she repeated the observation that Eaton made of her. "I am much more calm," she said. "I think you can use

the word 'stable.' I have been on the council 26 years. When I first got on the council, several of the other members would be argumentative toward me. I would stand my ground and express myself, but I can't think of even once where I raised my voice or got into something that got out of hand. Flare-ups and blow-ups don't help anybody. You have to work with all members of the council, even if on everything you don't see eye-to-eye, if you want to get anything accomplished."

The closest she came to making a criticism of Dutrey came when she admitted some irritation toward him over the way he or someone with his campaign was placing Dutrey's signs at the locations where she has posted her own, as if he is intent on upstaging her. "You can tell everyone that I'm not

putting my signs everywhere someone else is putting their signs," she said. "He is putting his signs, or paying someone to put his signs, in the places where my campaign went out and got permission to place them. I think he should be scouting out locations on his own," she said, implying that Dutrey allowing her to blaze that trail is an indication she has a greater degree of support across the community than he has.

Raft was born in Chattanooga, Tennessee and attended high school in Georgia. She and her husband had three children and moved to Montclair in 1984. They owned and operated a auto diagnostics center, which their son has been operating since their retirement.

required for the needed development that is in our future," she said. "Through the experience I have gained by my five years of service on the planning commission in addition to my nearly 8 years serving on council I have further developed this understanding. Our

city is beginning to build out its only commercial corridor and building infill residential, making this a crucial time to 'get it right.' So when I'm asked why I'm asking for another term as mayor, with our city reaching past fiscal health I believe that I can keep the city focused on delivering services within its means while finding outside sources. Further, I would not be doing all I can do for the residents of Grand Terrace if I do not continue to undertake the challenge of keeping the city heading toward fiscal sustainability. I believe I continue to be the right person for this position at this time and that I have demonstrated this for the past four years."

Robles said, "The mayoral role in Grand Terrace is to preside over the council meetings, sign documents and represent the city on regional bodies. A majority of the current council feel that we are blocked or stymied in our desire to better our method of governance. For example, for at least three years I have pushed for the adoption of a code of conduct, modeled after one in place in the City of Palo Alto. I believe and a majority of the current council believes this baseline of conduct would enable the council to better achieve consensus and better steer the

city's affairs."

As a real estate broker and prominent member of the city's business community and 14-year member of the Lions Club, McConnell has filled the dual role of being a member of the establishment and a leading critic of City Hall. His recent appointment to the Grand Terrace planning Commission has done little to mellow his willingness to tear into the powers that be. For some time, McConnell has suggested that the city has been, if not outright hostile to local entrepreneurs, then less than business friendly. He is also a local representative of the governmental reform movement We the People, which emphasizes the need for local government to demonstrate receptivity to the expressed desires of local residents.

"We became a city for 'self determination,'" McConnell said. "That means we didn't want Colton, the county or 'outsiders' making laws or deciding what was 'best' for 'We the People.' But over time the growing oppressive bureaucracy at City Hall, who are mostly nonresidents, have slowly fallen out of touch. For example, code enforcement ticketed me for growing food. There's just too much bureaucracy and too much regulation."

McConnell continued, "For more than 17 years, I have attended nearly all of the council meetings, been an active advocate for Grand Terrace, watched administrations and city employees come and go, and served on the board of the Grand Terrace Chamber of Commerce. I was the editor of the Blue Mountain Outlook for six years, am a member of the Lions Club and was chairman of the Grand Terrace Parks and Recreation Committee. Currently, I am a planning commissioner, vice chair of the ad hoc budget advisory committee, and I have organized petitions, multiple council workshops and committees. I understand what 'We the People' want: a safe community of soccer moms and Little

League dads where we can safely walk down the streets at night. We want more public safety without more taxes. It is time for change. We need a smaller and less oppressive government. It can be done. We can do it."

While he has demonstrated that he can work within the system, McConnell said, he remains a dissident who is campaigning with the slogan "Overhaul City Hall" and is committed to making major changes to the way the city conducts itself. This is demonstrated, McConnell suggested, by the intensity with which those who currently man City Hall are working to keep him out of office. "City Manager Harold Duffy, who got run out of Compton, is now going around and contacting property managers and owners to get them to remove my signs and shut down my political activities," McConnell said. He appealed directly to the city's voters to have them cast a jaundiced eye at City Hall's assertions that it is always acting in the citizens' best interest.

"You gave me a 2/3s vote during my "No on Measure C" campaign to

defeat the 5% utility tax in 2013," he said. "Vote for bold innovative ideas. Vote for change."

As a municipal management professional, Henderson said he sees tremendous untapped potential in Grand Terrace and it is for that reason that he wants to remain in office to guide the city appropriately.

"Grand Terrace is a city with very good demographics, a very good geographic location and many other attributes that make it attractive to families, businesses and investors," he said. Nevertheless, he indicated the city has squandered its superior position. "We

haven't taken advantage of those opportunities and made the kind of economic progress we should have made over the years," he said.

Henderson indicated the city council currently in place has moved beyond the "sketchiness" of the city's past and has made some appropriate adjustments.

Over the last decade, there has been only minimal development in Grand Terrace, and more

than one development proposal has fallen apart either as a consequence of external economic and financial considerations or hang-ups at City Hall. Henderson hailed the Gateway at Grand Terrace project proposal, which on paper calls for a 131-acre mixed-use and open-space development east of Interstate 215, as glimpse of the development possibilities for the city between now and 2030.

"We should utilize the Gateway Specific Plan as a vehicle for putting us on the path to what I hope to be economic sustainability," Henderson said. "I want to bring the city into the 21st Century from a jobs development and economic opportunity perspective."

Jeff Allen, who is employed as an instructor and is now serving a second four-year appointed term on the planning commission, is also competing to complete Reinartz's term. A meat and potatoes sort of fellow, he has assailed McConnell as "a real estate developer and Henderson as an RDA [redevelopment agency] bureaucrat." Like Henderson, he supports the Gateway at Grand Terrace Project and he echoes McConnell with regard to accomplishing the city's primary tasks without raising taxes. "As a supporter of the Gateway project I believe, through

balanced economic development and building strong relationships with our community partners, together we will move our city into the future confident in our long term financial stability," Allen said.

"I am against the continuous effort by some of the members of the city council to force a tax increase on Grand Terrace's residents," Allen said. Allen was heavily involved in the Grand Terrace effort to create a Community Emergency Response Team, leading that effort as a director. He is laudatory about the city's efforts to ensure public safety.

"Our city is already one of the safest in the area," he said. "With my leadership it can become the safest without raising taxes or imposing assessments on our residents."

A U.S. Army veteran, VA hospital volunteer and chairman of the San Bernardino County Veterans Advisory Committee, Allen said, "Our volunteers are the oil that keeps Grand Terrace running smoothly. Let's work together to grow our Citizens On Patrol volunteers for an increased presence of marked patrol cars dedicated to our city. I believe this will have a positive impact on our already low crime statistics."

If elected, Allen said he would "push for upgrades of the Michigan Street corridor, including lights, sidewalks, storm drains. I will partner with Colton to stabilize Mt. Vernon Hill."

Doug Wilson offers himself as the "budget watchdog" on the city council, who has made the citizens of Grand Terrace his priority. A former member and chairman of the planning commission, he has pronounced himself to be the mortal enemy of "waste, bail-outs, budget mysteries, and taxes. 42 years of troubleshooting and working with local jurisdictions to create places for families to live has taught me that government and business must walk hand-in-hand with the needs of the community to prosper,"

he said.

"In my professional life I handled \$100 million dollar annual budgets, cash flows, schedules, and lived and breathed legal agreements, bonding and contracting," Wilson said, conveying that he does not need to rely upon so-called "experts" to make a decision.

Wilson said he is an advocate for "building a great legacy for our children and grandchildren by running the City of Grand Terrace like the business that it is, and by providing necessary services while maintaining a firm hand on the check book."

Wilson's opponent is Greg Batla, a man of the cloth who has been a pastor to a congregation, worked in television production and is currently the executive director of marketing at Loma Linda University Health.

Batla vowed to "bring a fresh perspective to City Hall." He said his instinct was that Grand Terrace need not expand to become much more than it already is, which he said is a wonderful bedroom community in which to live and raise a family.

return Grand Terrace to the small town, community-feeling of the past."

Batla is not opposed to development, but said it should consist of "high-quality, locally-owned businesses" that "fill vacant spaces, potentially including retail shops, a gym, and a coffee shop." He said the city should use increased tax revenue from new businesses to invest in infrastructure improvements, including "roadways and sidewalks, street lighting, community areas and walking trails, as well as crime prevention."



from Apple Valley, told the *Sentinel*, "This incident with Eric Negrete is something that happened ten years ago. It has nothing to do with him acting in the scope of being a city councilman. Eric Negrete has dedicated his life to 'God and County.' He served and fought for his country in the U.S. Air Force and now he has shown the same commitment to his country and community while holding public office. He has shown leadership. He opposed Proposition 47, which reduces the seriousness of criminal offenses, and Proposition 57, which called for the early release of criminals. He was against Assembly Bill 109, which took inmates out of prison where they should be and instead has them overburdening our county jails. He opposed Senate Bill 54. Senate Bill 54 has nothing to do with illegal immigration in

which many misinterpret the body and language of the law and everything to do with harboring criminals. He will never compromise his oath of office."

Cordova said, "Eric has firmly, boldly and courageously stood up for the protection and safety of our community, and without reservation. He stands down passionately stands for the rule of law and has lived up to his oath and legal duty and obligation to protect and defend the people of Victorville and the Constitution of the United States, with perseverance."

There were easily detectable signs of the highly political nature of the orchestrated campaign to discredit Negrete, Cordova said. She noted that Negrete and his council colleague, Blanca Gomez, represent diametrically opposing world views, and that Negrete has proven to be a far more articulate and convincing proponent of his position than Gomez has been of hers.

"It is clear on its face that the Victorville City

Councilwoman Blanca Gomez set this up while making wrongful accusations against him and others, sadly," said Cordova. "She has established this pattern and practice absent supporting evidence or basis, whatsoever."

Cordova said, "This is a very critical time in the history of America, and leadership must pull together to protect the blindfold of justice, which Blanca Gomez and the rest of the Democrats maliciously fail to defend. The press supports the Democratic Party. This was an effort to damage Mr. Negrete. If that is all the press can find, he is doing pretty good."

Raul Rodriguez, Jr. is the California coordinator of America First Latinos and is associated with the We The People Rising conservative political action group. He was a candidate in the June Primary for California Secretary of State, finishing third.

Rodriguez said everything about the KPCC/National Public Radio report, from its timing to

its content, was suspect. "I don't like the idea behind National Public Radio's hit piece on Eric at all," Rodriguez said. "I think the Democrats have a pattern of trying to discredit individuals they fear politically. This happened ten years ago. We're all sinners and some people take that to the point of trying to make others look bad. I met Eric Negrete some time ago. I know him. He is a very patriotic individual. I believe he is worthy of his position and has done a good job working with the City of Victorville, trying to benefit those within the city."

Based on Negrete's merits in a straightforward comparison between him and the other candidates in the city council race, Rodriguez said Negrete is clearly the superior choice. "I think he is an individual of character and trust, and the people should vote for him," according to Rodriguez. "He had momentum [in the current race.] Blanca [Gomez] is trying to destroy him. She is trying

to destroy Victorville. What she has been doing is having La Raza and CHIRLA, the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights Los Angeles, come into the city and take over. This has been very disruptive. There is a recall attempt against her ongoing now, and this takes the focus off that."

Rodriguez continued, "National Public Radio came in here and did this hit piece on him. I think it was wrong and unfair. If they want to be fair, they should put out information on everyone. There is another candidate in the race, Valentin Godina, stealing signs.

You have Ms. Gomez's transgressions. They are not reporting on that. The piece they did was one-sided, because their intent was to damage Mr. Negrete."

Rodriguez predicted that Negrete will weather the storm. "He is going to be the hardest guy to beat," Rodriguez said. "I am myself a Latino. I am a Republican. I am a conservative. There are Latinos out there who are changing their political

affiliation because they are sick and tired of what the Democrats are doing. The Republicans won in 2016 and Donald Trump is president. The Democrats can't get over that. Look at how they carried on with the nomination of Brett Kavanaugh to the Supreme Court. The American people are fed up with what they [the Democrats] are doing. I have a feeling there is a red tide coming throughout the United States and in California. I think people are waking up."

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
