

Sheriff's Department In Operations To Curtail Smash & Grab Swarm Robberies

The San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, in an effort to get ahead of the retail theft curve that accompanies every holiday gift buying season but which has grown particularly acute in recent years, intensified its anti-shoplifting program in Rancho Cucamonga earlier this year.

With its Victoria Gardens shopping venue, Rancho Cucamonga for more than a decade has

made a bid to become the epicenter of San Bernardino County commercial activity, facing off against The Shoppes at Chino Hills, The Mills in Ontario, the Outlets at Barstow in Lenwood off the 15 Freeway, the Mall of Victor Valley and Montclair Place, the vestige of the once grandly successful Montclair Plaza. As a consequence, the sheriff's department, which serves as the contract police

department with Rancho Cucamonga, chose that city to make its most determined statement yet to those who have signed on to two of the fastest-growing trends in criminal activity throughout the country – swarm thefts and smash and grab robberies.

In a typical swarm theft, a significant number of participants – a dozen or more and, in some, multiple dozens or scores of thieves

– will enter a business and spend several minutes collecting and/or pocketing merchandise and then, upon a prearranged signal, walk out en masse without paying for any of it. By their sheer numbers, they overwhelm the clerks or store personnel and their ability to prevent what is occurring.

Smash and grab robberies likewise involve multiple participants, but usually far fewer than in

a swarm theft scenario. Such actions similarly involve a rush and entail, at the very least, implied violence which often extends to actual violence, with an intentional display of destruction or mayhem. A key element is the distraction or disabling of any form of security or theft preventative measures. This can involve the brandishing of weapons – usually firearms – or the employment of **See P 3**

Colton, Having Reduced City Council From 7 To 5, Looks To Eliminate Elected City Clerk

Prompted by the death of longtime City Clerk Carolina Padilla-Barrera eight months ago, the Colton City Council this week voted to put a measure on the March 2024 ballot to convert Colton's city clerk position from an elected to an appointed one.

Padilla-Barrera succeeded Helen Ramos, who subsequently became a councilwoman, as city clerk. She was

reelected in 2004, but was defeated in 2008 by Eileen Gomez and fell short once more in challenging Gomez in the 2012 election.

In 2014, however, Gomez elected to go to work in Laguna Niguel as city clerk there, when Rod Foster departed as city manager from Colton to take on the job in that Orange County city. Padilla-Barrera, who was then 70, was selected by the

city council to replace Gomez. Padilla-Barrera was reelected without opposition in 2016 and again in 2020.

Little fanfare attended her death in March. Deputy City Clerk Stephanie M. Vargas is filling the city clerk's position at present.

City officials, following a trend among cities to move toward having hired/appointed city clerks in recent years,

this week had the council consider transforming the city clerk's post from one that is elected to one chosen by the city manager and ratified by the city council.

The city council, with Mayor Frank Navarro and council members David Toro, Kelly Chastain and Luis Gonzalez dissenting, voted to put a ballot measure on the

March 5, 2024 ballot to make the city clerk an appointed position.

Gigi Hanna, who was San Bernardino's last elected city clerk who won election in 2011 and 2015 before the city went to even-year elections, was in place when the city went to employing an appointed city clerk in 2020, following a change in the city charter in 2016 that eliminated the elected city attorney, **See P 8**

Twentynine Palms Contemplating Returning State's \$50 Million Wastewater Plant Grant

Twentynine Palms officials are wrestling with the dilemma of whether to make good on a previous commitment to locate a wastewater treatment facility in the vicinity of Two Mile Road and Utah Trail, west of Sunmore Estates, while using a \$50 million grant from the State of California approved last month

to defray a major portion of the project's cost or whether they should return that money and seek to build the plant at a more remote location.

In determining whether it will be prudent to look the state's gift horse in the mouth, city officials are examining not only the prospect that the undertaking will have a deleterious impact on the immediate

vicinity around where it is to be located but what public expense would be entailed in paying to move it to another spot or, alternately, paying to relocate those whose homes or businesses are to be severely impacted by its presence.

At issue is concern among owners of residences and businesses near the proposed plant that it will expose to the

open air raw sewage that will render the area, if not inhabitable entirely, then so unpleasant that residency and commercial operations there will prove unviable.

With increases in population and the migration of higher volumes of untreated biowaste effluent and nitrates from the septic systems into the ground, the natural purification

process as the liquid moves downward accompanied by moisture from rainwater and other natural water recharge can prove insufficient before that flow reaches the water table. Such issues, referred to as nitrogen loading, are not as acute in Twentynine Palms as in Yucca Valley. Nevertheless, as the population in Twentynine Palms grows, water **See P 2**

Spun Out Sheriff's Deputy Arrested In Possession Of Crank While Working Jail Detail

A San Bernardino County Sheriff's deputy who was celebrated in his hometown of Fontana as an upstanding law enforcement type was arrested on Monday on suspicion of being under the influence of methamphetamine while on duty.

Samuel Espinoza, 35, who has been employed as a deputy with the department for five years, was taken into custody at his work site, the West

Valley Detention Center located at 9500 Etiwanda Avenue in Rancho Cucamonga, at 5:28 pm on November 6.

According to a summary of the incident provided by the sheriff's department, "Samuel Espinoza was ...assigned to the transportation division. While on duty, Espinoza's supervisor recognized him to be under the influence of a narcotic controlled substance. Ad-

ditionally, Espinoza was found to be in possession of a suspected narcotic controlled substance. Espinoza did not operate department vehicles occupied by inmates during his shift."

According to the summary, "Though this is an active and ongoing investigation, it does not appear Espinoza furnished narcotics to any inmates or other staff members. Espinoza was

subsequently placed under arrest for HS11550 (E) - Possession of a Narcotic Controlled Substance While Armed and PC4573.5 - Bringing Narcotics into a Jail Facility, both felony charges."

California Health & Safety Code 11550 (e) (1) pertains to "a person who is unlawfully under the influence of cocaine, cocaine base, heroin, methamphetamine, or phencyclidine while in

the immediate personal possession of a loaded, operable firearm."

There is a discrepancy between the text of the provided basis of one of the charges used in Espinoza's arrest and the department's characterization.

According to the California Penal Code, violating PC 4573 is a felony punishable by up to 3 years in county jail or prison. **See P 3**

Nick DePrisco, First Apple Valley Mayor, 1947-2023

Nick DePrisco Jr., the first mayor of Apple Valley whose adherence to the vision of the community as a place with a less-hurried and more rural atmosphere than the citified environment of Queens, New York where he was raised set the tenor for the town he co-founded, has died.

DePrisco, 75, passed away on September 29 in Laguna Woods from the complications of the pancreatic cancer he suffered from.

Born in New York on March 17, 1948, DePrisco was the son of Nicholas DePrisco and Gloria DePrisco. He spent his youth in Queens, attending Smithtown High School on Long Island.

As a young man, he came to California. He attended and graduated from California State University East Bay, also known as Cal State Hayward, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in sociology.

Out of college, DePrisco worked as a teacher for a time. He gravitated toward a career in law, attending Western State College of Law in San Diego and obtaining his juris doctor degree from Thomas Jefferson College of Law in 1977. He worked in private practice for nearly three years and in 1980, San Bernardino County Public Defender Charles Ward hired him as a deputy public defender.

usage and septic density and intensification will increase, overwhelming the leach fields and the earth below them and above the water table that serves as a natural filtration mechanism, which is also referred to by the term denitrification. Those "salts," to use a euphemism, which are not filtered out will in time overwhelm and foul the region's water supply. The increase in the septic load that will accompany more development in the area will increase this flow, such that the only way to prevent the polluting of the water supply is to create a water treatment system – a sewage treatment plant – to purify the water before it is allowed to migrate into the aquifer.

The US Geological Survey has ongoing studies of the nitrogen loading in the area in and around Twentynine Palms. The California Department of Water Resources is likewise encouraging Twentynine Palms to move forward with creating a water treatment facility.

In September 2021, Congressman Jay Obernolte was able to induce his Congressional colleagues to free up money from the National Defense Authorization Act to cover \$45 million of the cost for the construction of a wastewater treatment plant in Twentynine Palms, one that was to service, in the main, the Marine Corp Air Ground Combat Center, but which would also offer some treatment capability for a portion of the City of Twentynine Palms and provide clean water to be returned to the aquifer and boost the available groundwater supply.

In February 2022, the Twentynine Palms City Council voted to apply for a state grant to cover \$500,000 of the cost toward planning for the

city's comprehensive sewer system, the final total cost of which was estimated to run to \$150 million to \$200 million in 2022 dollars.

By Summer 2022, the federal government had allotted \$670,000 to jump start a wastewater treatment facility and another 1.27 million in federal funding was on the way.

In the February/March 2023 timeframe, then-Twentynine Palms City Manager Frank Luckino, who at one time had been the assistant general manager/ chief financial officer of the Hi-Desert Water District in Yucca Valley, had the city push ahead with seeking state funding/ state grants for completing Twentynine Palms sewer system. Last month, the state came through with a \$50 million grant to complete that work. Conceptually, the city is exploring the potential to tie the Marine base sewer system together with that portion of the city's system that will be most proximate to the base.

There are issues that complicate and make the Twentynine Palms Municipal Sewer Project highly problematic.

The Twentynine Palms Water District provides service to 18,000 people within an 87-square mile jurisdiction, which includes 27.9-square miles outside the 59.1-square mile Twentynine Palms city limits. One hundred percent of the district's water supply comes from local groundwater and the district draws its water from 10 wells located mostly along the southern edge of the service area. The district maintains 200 miles of pipeline, 10 water storage reservoirs with a total 17-million-gallon storage capacity and utilizes roughly 8,000 meters to deliver that water to customers. That there is no sewer system in the district at present, with wastewater disposed of through septic tank systems, presents a potential challenge to the quality of water the district can continue to deliver. The district there-

fore embraces the move toward a water treatment system. Still, this makes certain things difficult.

Water is pumped through eight booster stations strategically located throughout the district to lift water up and over hills for distribution.

In 1998, the district secured \$1.7 million in grants from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to help build a treatment plant to remove fluoride, a mineral that occurs naturally in the local groundwater. The plant came on-line in March 2003, enabling the district to tap additional supplies from the Mesquite Springs aquifer. An intermix of treatment plants in one area, however, can create conflicts in terms of chemistry, recharge and operation.

City officials had initially planned on locating the sewage treatment plant on Amboy Road east of Adobe Road, but the water district had concerns about having the treatment plant that close to the fluoride treatment plant. That necessitated a move to where the city is now purposed to place it, in the vicinity of Two Mile Road and Utah Trail. That site determination was a function of multiple factors, some of which were dictated by practical considerations and others imposed by discussion through the city's wastewater advisory committee.

Residents and business owners near the proposed site have lodged protests, and they are pressuring city officials to move the plant's proposed location from northwest of Twentynine Palms Highway and Utah Trail, to one of two parcels east of that location, one just west of Utah Trail or east of Utah Trail.

Resident Joseph Carder and other residents, including Rita Lilly, are pressing the city to move the plant to a more remote location, well away from any property that is currently developed or populated.

According to Carder, property within the city he circumscribed as be-

ing subject to devaluation as a consequence of the currently planned location of the sewage plant includes the city's downtown district to the west, the Oasis of Mara and 29 Palms Inn to the south, Campbell House to the east and Twentynine Palms Elementary School to the north. Lilly wanted to know what financial liability the city would have with regard to those residents and businesses negatively impacted by the plant's presence.

Luckino sought to accommodate questions with regard to moving the plant further east, but doing so would represent a problem relating to system efficiency and added cost. The farther east the plant goes, the greater distance the sewer lines must extend, adding costs to the project. Going much farther than its current planned site will add to the overall and initial cost. Going farther than Utah Trail, to as far east as the existent off-road motorcycle track would burden the project with at least \$8 million more in cost and as much as \$10 million more. The proposed location north of Highway 62 and west of Utah Trail, according to Luckino, offers the best spot in terms of topography, such that gravity will do much of the work. Locating it elsewhere, he said, would make the undertaking more expensive, as lift stations would be needed to pump the effluent uphill and raising the line to prevent it from being subject to damage from flooding would be required.

Councilman Octavius Scott has expressed interest in seeing if the plant can be located closer to the city's industrial district.

Wastewater advisory committee members such as Karalee Hargrave and Dawn Benton III, while saying they wanted to prevent local residents from having their property devalued because of their proximity to the project, reckoned that some landowners would have to be put out, since forcing the project to be located

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farther and farther east would outright kill the project.

Temporizing further might kill the project, as well. In order for the state to come through with the \$50 million in funding, the city has to firm up its plan and provide it to Sacramento by the end of January.

If it is to be completed, the project will entail more than 27 miles of sewer collection piping and a wastewater treatment plant with a peak treatment capacity of 2.25 million gallons per day.

The project is to proceed in three phases.

Phase 1 of the proposed wastewater reclamation project as articulated in its most cogent recent form is centrally located within city limits, that being the area surrounding the northern Adobe Road area, in essence bounded by Amboy Road to the north, Bagdad Highway to the east, Baseline Road to the south, and Morongo Road to the west. Phase 1 of the project is supposed to be completed by the end of 2026.

Phase two would be constructed to service the downtown area.

Further complication still exists in Luckino's departure as city manager to take up a similar post in Desert Hot Springs. His determination to see the project undertaken was a primary factor in the city getting the state grant to finance it. Without him present and with elements of the community trying to block it from being built to prevent the project from having

a negative effect on the value of their property, the project might die, and the \$50 million in state funding to be used toward that goal will evaporate.

Councilman Scott, in response to the residents concerned about the sewage treatment plant's implication for their property values, is heavily leaning toward having the city return the money to the state. Mayor McArthur Wright and the three remaining members of the council are less than sanguine about surrendering funding that would be difficult and perhaps impossible to replace. Meanwhile, Larry Bowden, who has been brought in as a caretaker city manager while Luckino's replacement is found, finds himself intensely engaged with the assignment of determining if it is feasible to move the proposed treatment plant east, away from the property of residents to be most heavily impacted by the project without having the costs of the plant construction and its operation escalate to a level the city cannot afford.

If the city uses the state grant, existing residences will be able to hook up to the sewer system at no cost. If the city forgoes reception of the grant, homeowners will be saddled with a cost of about \$12,000 each in 2023 dollars to tie into the system. City officials are under the gun, either before the end of 2023 or certainly within the first few weeks of 2024, to decide on what they are to do.

According to the California Health & Safety Code, however, running afoul of HS 11550 is a “misdemeanor,” i.e., “a public offense punishable by imprisonment in a county jail for not exceeding one year or in state prison.”

Under California law, jail terms or prison sentences of a year or less are applied to misdemeanors and imprisonment for longer than a

year requires a felony conviction.

Espinoza’s jailing took place at a department facility other than the one at which he most recently worked, possibly to avoid exposing him to inmates with whom he had come into contact in his role as a deputy and one of their jailers.

According to the sheriff’s department, “Espinoza was booked at the High Desert Detention Center, posted bail and

was released from custody.”

Further, according to the department, “Espinoza voluntarily resigned from the sheriff’s department.”

The department’s release of information on the case was provided mid-afternoon on November 7. The department did not disclose how it was able to induce Espinoza’s resignation, whether testing on the substance found in Es-

pinoza’s possession was performed, how the department gained access to the substance in his possession, the results of any analysis of the substance in his possession or how the department was able to obtain the results of any toxicology testing Espinoza was subjected to within 24 hours of his arrest.

According to the department, the department is still looking into Espinoza’s activity and

has asked members of the public “with information related to this investigation... to contact Sergeant J. Ramstad of the San Bernardino County Sheriff’s Department Transportation Division.” According to the department, information obtained during the course of the investigation relating to Espinoza will “be forwarded to the San Bernardino County District Attorney’s Office” for possible prosecution.

“Events like these, while unfortunate, demonstrate our resolve and commitment to addressing crime, even when the suspect is a deputy,” said Sheriff Shannon Dicus. “I am proud of the supervisors for interceding and upholding the public’s trust. I am disappointed by the choices my deputy made, and even though he no longer works for the department, it’s my hope that he receives the help he needs.”

DePrisco Was Among Apple Valley’s Founders & Early Civic Authorities from front page

Because he was to work primarily out of the Victorville Courthouse, DePrisco and his wife moved to Apple Valley. He remained with the San Bernardino County Public Defender’s Office until 1987. He returned to private practice that year in a partnership with Robert Ponce in Victorville. He handled all manner of criminal law from misdemeanors to felonies, including driving under the influence, driving while intoxicated, drug crimes, traffic violations, juvenile crimes, sexual assault, parole and probation compliance, homicide/murder and white collar crime, along with family law cases extend-

ing to divorce child custody, child support and visitation rights.

While in Apple Valley, DePrisco was a member of the Victor Valley Democratic Club, ultimately serving two terms as president of that organization. He was also a part-time instructor at Victor Valley college where he taught criminal law.

As early as 1980, a municipal incorporation drive manifested in Apple Valley, one which cost in the neighborhood of \$42,242 from start to finish to carry out and was funded by the municipal formation proponents. The movement was supported by a core of between 50 and 100 residents, who elected to have Apple Valley incorporate as a town rather than a city. In 1988, the incorporation question was placed on the November 8 ballot and 33 of

the incorporation sponsors vied for a position on the maiden council in an accompanying race that would count only if the incorporation initiative, known as Measure K, succeeded.

Measure K cruised to easy passage with 10,683 votes or 83.4 percent of those participating in favor. A second initiative, Measure L, passed, installing at-large elections. Of those 33 candidates for the town council, only 12 raised enough money for their campaigns to be required to itemize the donations they had received. The dozen collected a combined total of \$51,310 in electioneering money. DePrisco ran the most effective campaign of the 33, garnering the top number of votes, followed by Heidi Larkin, Dick Pearson, Carl Coleman and Jack Collingsworth. Thus, DePrisco,

Larkin, Pearson, Coleman and Collingsworth became the town’s first council and DePrisco, as the most popular among the five with the town’s voters, was named mayor of what was San Bernardino County’s 21st municipality.

Elsewhere in the county – even as close as Victorville and Hesperia – there was aggressive development taking place. Apple Valley came to represent a bulwark against that trend. Apple Valley soon adopted as part of the town code a limitation on the intensity of development that called for minimum half acre lots with the construction of single family residential homes. DePrisco was a prime mover in the effort to ensure that lot sizes remained large and homes were set back from the street and from each other.

While in office, De-

Prisco allowed Apple Valley to unite with the City of Victorville in the formation of the Victor Valley Economic Development Authority, which also initially involved Hesperia and the County of San Bernardino, and was intended as an administrative vehicle by which local control of the property at George Air Force Base, which was shuttered by the Department of Defense in 1992, could be wielded for civilian use conversion. In time, however, DePrisco came to recognize that the authority, known by its acronym VVEDA, was being manipulated by Victorville so that city could take control of the base property, acing out the City of Adelanto, which was actually more proximate to the base property than Victorville. DePrisco, perceiving that there was little benefit to Apple Valley

in the arrangements relating to the former base property, sought to prevent the one-side domination of VVEDA by Victorville as time progressed, but was politically outmuscled in that effort, and Victorville ultimately took possession of the air base, which is now known as Southern California Logistics Airport and is managed by Victorville.

DePrisco, whose work as a public defender and defense attorney put him into a position of closely witnessing the work of local law enforcement, at one point pressed to have the cities of Victorville and Hesperia and the Town of Apple Valley close out their separate contracts with the San Bernardino County Sheriff’s Department for the provision of law enforcement service and, using the benefits of the

chemical agents such as bear spray, pepper spray or mace against any security guards, the use of hammers or heavy metal rods in smashing glass display or containment cases, all carried out rapidly and with aggression. In effectuating such a thefts, perpetrators are not reluctant to make noise or conspicuously inflict damage on property to accentuate the intimidation effect. Upscale stores featuring expensive items and valuable commodities are popular smash and grab robbery targets.

Upon the conclusion of such criminal opera-

tions, the perpetrators will generally hastily flee the scene, often in a stolen vehicle or one in which identifying features such as license plates or window emblems or placards have been altered or substituted and which can be removed or interchanged.

Such crimes spiked in the midst of the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic. Initially, law enforcement entities and professional security experts maintained that the pandemic was not a driving factor in the uptick in such crimes, but it seems obvious to most observers that the ubiquity of public masking in which all customers were wearing face masks created a situation which allowed perpetrators to make entrance into retail es-

tablishments or malls with their faces and outward identities obscured without alarming or putting those agents which could combat the thefts on alert, allowing the criminal activity to manifest quickly and without much prospect of stopping it before its completion and those who have carried it off have made their exodus.

With COVID-19 variants on the rise and the Christmas shopping season just around the corner, there is a prospect of a resurgence or intensification of such theft. Moreover, while San Bernardino County, like most other areas outside the footprint of metropolitan/inner city districts, has not been absolutely immune from such activ-

ity, the vast majority of swarm theft and smash and grab robberies have plagued stores in major US cities, where mobs of thieves can pull off brazen nighttime robberies and rapidly meld into the general population after making off with valuable merchandise.

This summer, there were events in Southern California to suggest that the pattern of such thefts, which had for the most part confined themselves to Los Angeles and its greater metropolitan area, was moving eastward and that the perpetrators were boldly willing to operate in broad daylight.

On Thursday June 29, at roughly 3 p.m., a vehicle parked immediately in front of the Diamond Center located at 147

Yale Avenue in the Claremont Village, roughly one mile distant from the Los Angeles County/San Bernardino County border, at which point three individuals wearing ski masks, gloves, and hooded sweatshirts emerged while the driver remained behind the wheel. The trio went into the jewelry store, shattered numerous display cases with hammers before taking as much jewelry as they could quickly gather and then quickly piled into the car, which immediately headed a short distance west on Second Avenue before driving south to the 10 Freeway and east, back toward Los Angeles. A similar caper was pulled in La Verne nearly four weeks later.

The June 29 theft replicated much of what had occurred in January 2022 during a similar but slightly differently choreographed smash and grab which took place two blocks further north on Yale Avenue at 4C’s Finecraft Jewelry.

In that crime, two of the three suspects who came into the shop sprayed employees with mace. While the employees were incapacitated, the thieves smashed display cases and, acting somewhat more methodically than in this year’s Diamond Center robbery, seized numerous pieces of jewelry and then fled further north on Yale to their getaway vehicle. Subsequently, the perpetrators of that

Last year, Colton’s city council transitioned from a mayor and six councilors to a mayor and four council members.

economies of scale that could be had, form a tricity police department. That effort, despite getting further support from other local politicians, never came to fruition.

DePrisco remained on the Apple Valley Town

Council until 1996. That same year, he left private practice to become a public defender once again in Riverside County. In 1999, he was promoted to the position of supervising public defender in Riverside County, a post he remained in until 2003. DePrisco moved to

Orange County, ultimately to the upscale community of Laguna Woods. There he returned to private legal practice, with offices in Mission Viejo and Ladera Ranch. He discontinued practicing law in 2020. DePrisco considered himself an amateur musician and athlete, playing the guitar, piano, organ and tennis, as well as riding horses with aplomb. Despite living in California more than twice as long as he had on the East Coast, he was never able to lose his New York accent. DePrisco was avidly

involved in promoting what he considered progressive political ideals, until recently lamenting the Democratic Party’s decision to have Hillary Clinton as its standard bearer in the 2016 presidential election rather than Bernie Sanders. He is survived by his daughter, Berkeley De-

Prisco; his sister, Barbara Cozza Ph.D., a professor of educational leadership in the Department of Administrative and Instructional Leadership at the School of Education at St. John’s University in Queens; his sister, Carol Stoerback and brother, Bill DePrisco. -Mark Gutglueck

capaper were caught.

Those engaging in larceny generally and in particular involving forceful theft in retail establishments are doing so in part because of the relatively weak law enforcement and prosecutorial activity of authorities with regard to such crimes. One quoted statistic relating to swarm theft and smash and grab robbery is that during the official period defined as the pandemic, larceny and theft increased by 88

percent. In recent times, following the official end of the pandemic, authorities are seeing an amalgamation of the swarm thefts and smash and grab techniques, usually involving perpetrators entering stores wearing masks or hoods or both, making it difficult to identify them even when their images are captured on security videos, followed by aggressive tactics to obtain merchandise, with the perpetrators rapidly fleeing. Statistically, those who have been caught and arrested for this type of activity have preexist-

ing criminal records. At least some of those colared have indicated they were not deterred by the law because they believe there is little chance they will be caught and if they are, the consequences are not that onerous. While such crimes are not high on law enforcement’s priority list elsewhere, in San Bernardino County the sheriff’s office this summer began to target such activity to ward off further commercial theft in the region. The place the department made its most conspicuous show of the de-

termination to make San Bernardino County inhospitable to those who would ply their larcenous trade was Rancho Cucamonga. Starting on July 27 and running through November 3, the department assigned a concerted number of deputies to what it termed its retail theft team, which focused on T.J. Maxx, HomeGoods, Costco, Victoria’s Secret, Ulta, Sephora, Target, Macy’s, Lululemon, Walmart, Zumiez and Home Depot. The involved deputies focused their vigilance in concentrated

enforcement operations that went beyond their normal regular patrols of the city’s commercial districts. The effort involved coordination with the various retail outlets’ security personnel, loss prevention specialists and store managers. Store employees were encouraged to communicate with the deputies in real time to nab perpetrators in the act. A review of the operation’s results show that a significant number of thieves targeting the local commercial establishments are parts of organized networks

engaged in retail crime across Southern California. The San Bernardino County District Attorney’s Office is following up on the arrests that were made. This includes the prosecution of 34 individuals picked up during the course of five demarcated operations over the course of more than three months. Those arrested were taken in for burglary, robbery, grand theft and petty theft involving merchandise worth at least \$50,000 that has been recovered. -Mark Gutglueck
